

> WASHINGTON, July 3.—When the fiscal year closed Tuesday there was a deficit in the United States Treasury of approximately \$60,000,000 for the last twelve months. This big deficit is to be compared with a surplus one year ago of more than \$54,000,000, so the real differed between the conditions of the Treasury today and one year ago is expressed by the enormous sum of \$144,000,000.

The third battleship will be laid down as soon as the Minas Geraes, now building at Elswick, is off the stip. In distribution of guns, in armor protection, in speed and in displacement the ships are identical with the latest building for the Japanese nevy.

On the other hand, while the Japanese have adopted the turbine and installed the Mizbara, or Belleville, boilers in their ships, these vessels are given reciprocating engines and Bothwick boilers. They are designed by J. R. Perrett, of Elswick.

The cruisers are to be fast ships of the British Boadicea type, and in this connection it is to be noted that it is now in contemplation to build four training ships, which will be in reality protected cruisers closely resembling the other two. Their armament will be ten 4.7 inch and eight six-inch guns; their speed will be about twenty-six knots.
