

# PROVINCIAL ACCOUNTS SINCE FISCAL YEAR CLOSE

### Statement of Consolidated Revenue Account Tabled by Hon. H. F. McLeod Yesterday.

Fredericton, Feb. 26.—In the legislature this afternoon the statement of the Consolidated Revenue Account for the fiscal year, 1912, to February 12th, 1913, was presented by Hon. H. F. McLeod, provincial secretary.

The statement shows that for the period, which is the season of larger expenditures and smaller receipts than later in the fiscal year, the expenditures chargeable to ordinary revenue were about \$60,000 more than the revenue. Included among the expenditures are the big items of \$125,000 for public works, and slightly more than \$100,000 for education.

# AUSTRIA AND RUSSIA DEMOLISH THEIR FORCES ON FRONTIER

### St. Petersburg, Feb. 26.—Demolition of the Austrian and Russian forces has been decided upon, according to information from a most reliable source, as a result of the recent exchange of letters between Emperor Francis Joseph and the Russian Emperor.

The extra units concentrated on the respective frontiers, it is stated, will be simultaneously withdrawn in the near future and the reserves disbanded. It is understood that the details of this measure were discussed at a special council which assembled at Tsarskoe-Selo yesterday under the presidency of Emperor Nicholas. The premier and minister of foreign affairs, war and marine, and the chief of the general staff were present.

The bill to amend the Lancaster Sewerage Act was then considered.
