PLAYGROUNDS
OF "KIDDIES"

Opening of West Side Playgrounds an Important Event for Children.

EXERCISES ATTENDED BY A LARGE CROWD

Interesting Addresses by Prominent Speakers—New Recreation Large and well Provided for.

In the presence of a large crowd on Saturday afternoon the new playgrounds on the West Side were formally opened. The ceremony was brief and more or less informal in its character, consisting of short addresses by His Worship Mayor Frink, Commissioners Agar and Wigmore, C. B. Lockhart, Rev. Mr. Sampson, Rev. E. E. Thomas.

The proceedings began shortly after four o'clock. The playgrounds movement has in the past few years taken a strong hold here, and that the people of the city are thoroughly alive to the great benefit of the movement was admirably attested both by the size of the gathering and by the interest with which the exercises were followed. A conspicuous feature about the affair was the large number of prominent citizens who attended, and who throughout the afternoon gave evidence of their interest in the work which the Playgrounds Association is endeavoring to carry out.

At about a quarter of four o'clock the crowd gathered near the improvised platform and the meeting was called to order by Miss Isabel Peters, president of the Playgrounds Association in the city. Miss Peters called upon Commissioner Agar to act as chairman during the opening exercises.

In a brief address Mr. Agar congratulated the people of the West Side on such a valuable acquisition as the new playgrounds will undoubtedly prove to the community. The work of the playgrounds movement has progressed throughout the city, he said, and he was pleased to see the movement spread on the West Side. He congratulated Miss Peters, her associates who are doing so great a work in the interests of the children of the city by providing the children of the city with grounds where they will be able to enjoy themselves during the summer vacation under the supervision of teachers.

He then called upon His Worship Mayor Frink who made a brief but happy address in which he expressed his pleasure that the playgrounds had been brought into the circle of playgrounds. He dwelt upon the importance which playgrounds work plays in any city and said he was glad that St. John is getting in line and providing grounds for the children.

His Worship returned to the splendid work of Joseph Allison and his generosity in the interests of the children. His sympathy and help in the matter of improved playgrounds had made it possible for hundreds of children who are obliged by circumstances to spend the summer in the city to enjoy their summer and pleasures which make childhood a cherished memory in after life.

Mayor Frink also referred to the work of Walter Allison who has identified himself with the playgrounds idea and has been a most enthusiastic worker in the interest of the movement.

C. B. Lockhart, M.L.A., the next speaker, expressed his pleasure that West St. John had taken the playgrounds of its own. He said he was appreciative of the work which the Playgrounds Association is doing in the interests of the children of the city and felt that the grounds in Carleton would prove an acquisition in that community.

Rev. H. E. Thomas and Rev. Mr. Sampson followed with short addresses. They joined with the preceding speakers in their expressions of appreciation of the efforts of the association in opening a ground in that part of the city. The work which the association has undertaken and which is carrying on so successfully, they said, is an important one and should appeal to all citizens who are alive to the interests of the community.

Commissioner Wigmore spoke along the same lines. He expressed himself as very much in sympathy with the work of the association and said that as long as he held the office of commissioner he would endeavor to further the work of the Playgrounds Association wherever possible.

This concluded the programme of addresses and the grounds were then declared formally opened.

The announcement brought joy to the hearts of the youngsters who, during the speeches, had listened as attentively as possible, considering that their impatience to test the apparatus provided for them and to begin the games, and no sooner had the word been given than there was a scramble for the different games and in a few minutes the kiddies were enjoying themselves to their hearts' content, the sight of them at play being in itself sufficient recompense to the ladies and gentlemen of the association and to all who were instrumental in making playgrounds for the children on the West Side a possibility.

The new recreation grounds will prove a great boon. Their central location is a feature which will enhance their value. The grounds are ideal for the purpose and when all the equipment is in place will be among the best of the group provided by the association. Already considerable attention is being paid to the installation of the remainder as soon as possible.

The grounds are spacious, affording excellent opportunities for all kinds of sports. Through the efforts of the commissioners a large area has been

filled in and graded. The centrality of the grounds bring them within reach of a large number of children, and when everything is in running order the West Side will have a recreation ground well compared with any in the city.

The funeral will be held from his late residence at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Dr. Frederick N. Wellings, of Andover, passed away early Friday morning under peculiarly sad circumstances. He was doctor to the Indians at the Tobique reservation, Indian Point, and while attending a patient was stricken with heart trouble. When they got to the house with him when he died. 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CATHOLICS TO OBSERVE
CONSTANTINE JUBILEE

Sixteen Centuries Since
Constantine put Stop to
Persecutions Against
Christians.

An event of considerable interest and importance to Catholics throughout the world takes place this year when the Constantine Jubilee is to be observed by the church throughout the universe.

In the cathedral yesterday, as well as in all the Catholic churches of the diocese the pastoral of His Lordship Bishop LeBlond, dealing with the jubilee was read, in which the conditions of the jubilee were made known to the faithful.

The jubilee which in the diocese began yesterday and continues until December 8th next, the feast of the Immaculate Conception, is in commemoration of the sixteen years which have elapsed since the declaration of the Edict of Milan, which marked the cessation of the persecutions which for three hundred years had been waged against the Christians. The reign of peace for the Christian church was brought to a close by the Emperor Constantine and in commemoration of this truce the jubilee has been proclaimed.

Following the reading of the pastoral the letter sent by His Holiness Pope Pius declaring the jubilee was read. One of the conditions for the obtaining of the graces and indulgences of the jubilee is the visitation six times to the cathedral church, the parish church or church where mass is celebrated. To fulfill these visits any time between yesterday and December 8th suffices.

The jubilee marks an important event in the Catholic church this year and in Rome particularly will be celebrated with great solemnity.
