INTERESTING LETTER FROM  
SOLDIER IN THE FAR EAST

Canadian Officer Tells of His Experiences Fighting the  
Turks—Hardships on the Desert, Biting Sand  
Storms—Over Three Thousand Turks Captured Since  
Christmas.

Hundreds of letters are received in France, from soldiers who are doing battle in the Far East. There in that eastern country, the sons of the Empire are, doing their bit, fighting the war to make a free world. They are meeting with hardships, but they are not complaining. At last we have settled down, back normal "desert column" conditions. Then we arrived here by a final march, a few days before Christmas, we were in number, far in advance of the most advanced base, footsore and very weary.

There was a tremendous lot to do, and all to be done at once. We had to work feverishly, day and night, working against time, when, without warning, there burst upon us, a furious storm, hurricane wind, blinding sand alternating with torrents of rain, and an icy cold wind that numbed us.

This lasted for ten days and very uncomfortable days they were. We were in summer kit, shorts, no overcoat, and one blanket each, for our entire shelter. All through this weary pilgrimage we have had to carry our entire possessions on our backs, to naturally much had to be left out, and we were quite unprepared for such a storm. Half way through it, however, we managed to get our overcoat, and a little it was too wet to burn. We were digging all day and out at night, never dry, never away from the battering of sand and rain, always hungry and in need of sleep.

A Disagreeable Christmas. It was a Christmas and New Year that we will not readily forget. At last, it was over. The "harmless" storm was ended. And when the morning dawned, came blustering over the sea. We hailed the truant sun again that swept the curtains from the lowering sky, revealing the familiar glory of smiling azure blue, and we breathed a sigh of thankfulness, shook ourselves free from sand, and spread our selves out to dry.

Since then we have not fared so badly. We are off the outpost line again, and are busy with endless fatigues, disembarking, fatigue, well digging, fatigue, supply fatigue, and all the other thousand kinds of fatigue that are so dear to the hearts of all good soldiers—"The pomp and circumstance of glorious war!"

Daily Air Raids. The enemy has been unpleasantly attentive with daily air raids. These are prettier ways of expressing hostility than by showers of bombs, especially on moonlight nights, when one expects peace to work on undisturbed; but, for the best of reasons, German is getting shy of coming near us now.

"Herman, the airman, the nut with the plane. Who bomb us on Sinai though most by in vain; Oh Moses, our noses we stick in the sand, When Herman, the German, is out over the land."

We are settling down in comparative comfort, shopping and expecting to be on the forward track again soon. TWO-INTERESTING. The mounted troops, meanwhile, have been doing splendid work. They have smashed up two complete enemy forces and taken over three thousand prisoners since Christmas.

We envy them and feel our position very much, but it is a cavalry country and we do our own part. They could not get along without us, and we have had a big share in the fighting too, and hope for more in the near future when we strike hard ground again.

Varied Experiences. Our experience lately has been varied and interesting. A welcome change from the monotony of the last few months of slow advance over the endless desert.

On the second day of our hard march to get here, after foot sloggish to through the soft sand since dawn, we reached a sand hill about noon and became full upon the long lost sea. The relief was instant and intense, relief to eyes tortured by the yellow dazzle of the hot breathless air, relief of hard shore sand to tired feet. Soon we were marching along the shore, and then came a halt to water the horses. Instantly the surf was alive with bathers, a multitude of sun-scorched, and cooled footsore men, who plunged into the cooling sea as into Bethesda's pool, and found healing and relief. It was just at a place, too, where abandoned Turkish redoubts built for our reception, frowned down upon us like old toothless watch dogs.

An Eastern Town. As the evening shadows were gathering we came over another hill and found the town which has been our goal so long spread out before us on

brown eyes, and gleaming teeth, proclaimed their kinship with the boys of all the world, by marching ahead of us and the inevitable beggar whined his age-old lay.

It is a strange outpost of Empire, cut off by a hundred miles of desert from all intercourse of the busy world. Except that Mahomet has cast his spell upon them, his eighteen thousand inhabitants must be very much the same in appearance and customs as when it was a place of banishment for the Syrian kings. It is today, as it was ten thousand years ago, the jumping off place for the long pilgrimage across the desert to Egypt. I sit on the heights and look down on the town and forget that our aeroplanes hover over it, and our big guns go thundering through it, and the sea becomes another Galilee; I can name those fishermen with their nets and baskets, those husbandmen tilling in the surf, that woman sitting by the well; and I seem to see Another passing by that clump of fig trees, who looks at us with a questioning look—Or does he?

"He died to make men holy," so we die to men free. Would He question our cause today? That sturdy boy leading out his sheep and goats to the scanty pasture might be the brother of Abimelech, the son of Jesse, the chosen of Israel. The river, now dry, though it flowed swift and deep during the storm, is the "River of Egypt" of the Bible. Ezekiel, I think, speaks of it, as "The Brook of Egypt." Out of that well there Joseph's brethren would take supplies for the long desert journey. In the inn a later Joseph rated, doubtless, with Mary and a little child. Here the bones of Jacob rested, too, on that long journey to the field of Machpelah, before Mamre, in the land of Canaan.

A City of "Dogs and Smells." We marched through the place next morning on our way to take up an outpost line. The worthy citizens were very shy of us, and left us to be welcomed for the most part by the most prominent inhabitants, the dogs, and the smells. Here and there a group watched us, clustered together by the court of the ancient inn, or on the steps of the mosque, or from the roof of a village well.
