Uniform Rules in California.

In California more than eighty cities

have opened such camps and parks.

So many parties use them that

the Automobile Club of California

has found it necessary to issue

uniform rules throughout the territory.

These provide that every user must

register all members of his party,

that is, to have its individual

lot, 26 to 30 feet in dimension, that

no party shall stay in a given par-

ticular camp longer than 14 days by per-

mit, and that no salesmen or commis-

sionaries are to be allowed in the

space of 20 acres.
