Underground Causes Which Are Hurting U. S. Shipping

Senate Orders Investigation of Relations Between Foreign Lines and U. S. Rys.

Washington, Nov. 8.—A sweeping investigation by the Senate into alleged relations between foreign shipping lines and United States railroad lines, under which foreign shipping is given preference and the United States Merchant Marine crippled, is in sight. Senator Jones, of Washington, stirred the matter up in the Senate today and got a resolution passed calling for production of contracts between United States roads and foreign shipping lines. He expressed indignation over the situation, as did other Senators, and the prospects are there will be a thorough airing of underground causes which are alleged to have been hurting United States shipping.

Harding Summons Advisory Board to Study U. S. Policy

Washington, Nov. 8.—The advisory committee of twenty-one selected by President Harding to set with the American Big Four at the armament conference will be assembled in Washington three days in advance of the conference opening to give its opinion on the first steps of policy to be taken by this Government.

A call for a meeting of the committee on next Wednesday, November 9, was issued today by Secretary Hughes, and at the same time it was revealed that high officials expect the committee members to play an influential part in shaping the Government's course from the beginning to the end of the negotiations.

New York-London Plane Being Built in England

London, Nov. 8.—A mammoth airplane for service between London and New York is under construction by one of the biggest British aircraft manufacturers. It fulfills expectations of passengers that the machine will enable 160 passengers to sit on a single London-New York air route at midday the following morning, travelling at 130 miles an hour.

Everything about the giant ship will be novel. It will be a monoplane with a 400 foot span of high lift wing of great thickness, inside of which will be the passenger accommodations. There will be a restaurant in the body which will be designed along the lines of the big four, while in other cases sub-committees or advisors would be asked by the principal delegates to render opinion on details.

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British Shipping Policy Censured At Boston Convention

New York, Nov. 8.—The Shipping Board and the American Steamship Owners' Association, which have been trying to obtain for American vessels at least a part of the Egyptian cotton crop purchased for American mills, announced that the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers, in convention in Boston, had taken formal action deprecating the present British monopoly of transportation of its own Alexandria to the United States.

The resolution adopted by the cotton manufacturers and telephoned to Winthrop D. Starke, manager of the American Steamship Owners' Association, follows:

"Resolved: That in view of the considerable purchases of Egyptian cotton for the use of American mills and the future importance of this valuable material for American manufacture, the possession of the United States of the right to transport its own cotton to the United States is essential to the security of our commerce and vital to the national defence.

"We therefore, approve the effort which the United States Shipping Board is making to secure for American ships the carrying of a proper share of our imports of Egyptian cotton destined for American consumption, and we urge that the Board should be authorized to bring direct to Boston or New York or are brought directly via European ports to merchants and manufacturers on this side of the Atlantic."

Announcement made by Canadian Pacific that service between Canada and Cuba will be inaugurated by the steamer *Hansa*, on Sunday, December 5th, arriving Havana December 12th. On the return will leave Havana December 17th, arriving and leaving Boston, 22nd, due to St. John, 24th.

She brought forty-eight passengers, who found the chilly atmosphere of the St. John waterfront a great change from the warm sunlight and balmy breezes they had just left behind. Among those on board were Rev. E. M. Johnson, Rev. E. M. Malone and Lieut. W. B. C. Simpson, R. N. Six Chinese on their passage to the West Indies, and the trip was a very successful one. The ship was on average one for the time of year, with considerable rough weather between Bermuda and here, Sunday in particular being rough. The ship was brought no sugar, but had a fair-sized general cargo, a considerable portion of which was molasses.
