WHILE TEMPORARILY INSANE.

Verdict of Jury in Lockeport Tragedy--Father Expresses No Regret for His Terrible Deed.

Lockeport, July 9—(Special)—Sidney Locke, who killed his three children, was arrested yesterday afternoon on charge of murder, taken to Shelburne and lodged in jail. He expresses no regret for his terrible crime, which apparently had been premeditated for some time. He had a delusion that the children were going to starve to death. He says he brought them into the world and had a right to put them out of it. He intended killing them and himself Sunday last, but something interfered

An inquest was held before Coroner George K. Hines, and the following verdict rendered: "That deceased children came to their deaths by bullets fired from a revolver in the hands of their father, Sidney Locke, while he was laboring under temporary insanity."
