THE LATE ARTHUR PATTON

The elder Patton settled at once at Iroquois and there the subject of this sketch had since continuously resided. After receiving a good education, and when still a young man he embarked in the milling business, manufacturing stoves, etc. By hard work the business achieved a wide reputation out of which the owner had accumulated a handsome competence. He continued to take an active interest in the business up to the time of his taking ill. In addition the late Mr. Patton had been local agent for the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company for the past twenty years. About fifty years ago the late Mr. Patton was married to Miss Armstrong of Ogdensburg, and their union was a happy one. She survives together with one child, Mrs. W. G. Parish, of Athens. One son, Henry, died in Ottawa, about fifteen years ago.

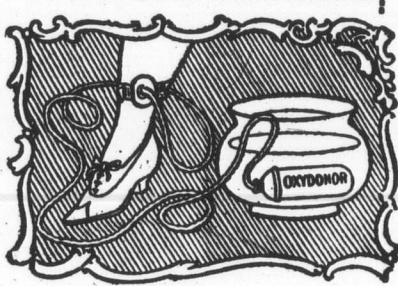
