The men are encouraged to let us know if they have any particular wants, and the visitors are also expected to keep us informed of their requirements. Many of these requests are most surprising and demonstrate a much exaggerated idea of our powers. It is difficult indeed to answer to the satisfaction of the inquirers such requests as the following: "You ask if there is anything you can do for me, please procure my brown kit bag for me. I left it behind in Edmonton." "Kindly arrange for my wife and family to get across here as quickly as possible." "I'd be glad to have a commission if you could fix it up for me."

Following an appeal in Canadian papers, many sacks of newspapers appear weekly at the offices at Cockspur Street; these are then distributed to the various hospitals, and the men receive with the greatest appreciation the news from home so eagerly longed for.

The ever increasing number of enquiries encourages us to hope that our work is not without value, and the most cheering feature is the constant stream of grateful thanks which pour in daily from the furthest outposts of Empire.
