We string together this morning certain facts for the consideration of our readers, which, although neither new nor previously unrecorded, are, we think, worthy of repetition, and deserving of being carefully treasured up in the minds of all who desire to see their adopted country prosper and happy.

This Canada is gifted with all the elements necessary to render her inhabitants highly prosperous, comfortable, and wealthy, it is a fact supported by the concurrent testimony of men of all classes, creeds, and countries, who are at all acquainted with her various natural capabilities.

A broad and fertile soil, a healthy climate, unexcelled facilities for internal water communication, boundless natural resources, inexhaustible mineral wealth, civil and religious liberty, protected by the majesty of law and by the authority of government; nothing appears to be wanting to her people, but a wise and judicious use of the advantages which she possesses.

Party has been applied and properly designated "the madness of man for the gain of a few," and this "madness of the many" has impressed an indelible diabolical and substantial injury upon the Colony. The pages of its history have been stained with blood, and the red-handed perpetrators sit in seats of honor, have crowns—we should say dollars—put into their purses, and are taken to the bosoms and the confidence of its political conservators.

The self-possessed, cool concentration of party hatred, is more to be feared than the bold above-board force of steel and gunpowder. We hear that the Government have been so outrageously generous as to make a grant of £1000 to the School called Knox's College, Toronto, which is a penitence of the Free Kirk, and these outrageously voluntary Professors have of course accepted the gift with becoming modesty. It appears, therefore, that there is not the slightest inconsistency in a Free Kirk Professor stretching out his right hand in righteous fervor to denounce all State paid Schools and Churches, while with his left he quietly pockets a large sum of Government money for the support of his own Ecclesiastical Nursery.

When the Bishop of Toronto simply asks a charter for his College, he is insulted and covered with abuse by the partisans of the Free Kirk, who licitly eulogize Churchmen, because they are an unimpeachable support the principles of their Communion, while they themselves not only clamorously ask, but greedily receive and absorb sums of money from the public purse for the sustentation of their Schools and so called Colleges. We must have a new dictionary of our language—the modern conception of words are no longer applicable to the pious practices of the members of Endowments.
