GLADSTONE'S VIEW OF IT

The following from Premier Borden's great speech on the navy question is worth repeating:

When Mr. Gladstone, then Liberal Premier of Great Britain, introduced a closure bill in the House of Commons in 1888, he said in part—

"It is not a very easy matter to define obstruction, and I will not attempt to define it for any one but myself. I will only give my description of it. To me it appears to be the disposition either of the minority of the House or individuals to resist the prevailing will of the House otherwise than by argument."

The Premier also noted a definition of Speaker Brand of the British House on obstruction as "the abuse of the privileges of the freedom of debate for the purpose of defeating the will of Parliament."

Continuing, the Premier stated: "We do not desire to depart from the constitutional tradition of this House, or take any steps that may not be absolutely necessary. Hon. gentlemen opposite on more than one occasion have boasted of their ability to force us to dissolve and go before the Crown. That has been the constant boast through certain elements of the press of the Province of Quebec. If it were possible for an opposition to do this session, it would also be possible for them to do it next session, and the session following; and the result that instead of the Constitution of Parliament being defended, as it always has been in the past, by the Crown, on the advice of responsible ministers, it would be determined by the opposition, a minority in Parliament."

LORD WOLSELEY.

The passing of Field Marshal Viscount Wolseley removes a notable figure from the world's stage. Like Lord Roberts he had lived to be an octogenarian, although the latter of those contained many fight incidents of great personal danger.

Like so many other great soldiers he was born in Ireland, and in early life went through the Burmese war, the Crimean war, the Indian war and the Chinese war.

His name has always had a special interest for Canadians as in 1870 he was given command of the troops sent to Fort Garry to quell the Red River rebellion led by Riel.

To us of this date that might not seem like a very great exploit, but in reality it was quite that under the existing circumstances. At that period there was not a line of railway beyond Thunder Bay and from that point onward it was a case of boats and portages or else road and bridge building. For instance it took Wolseley's troops with their heavy equipment many weeks to reach Fort Garry—now Winnipeg—a point now reached by train in a little over twelve hours.

The control of the expedition demanded much skill and resource and both these qualities the deceased manifested to a marked extent.

After that event he commanded troops in the Ashanti war, in Zululand, in the Egyptian war, the Gordon relief expedition and so on. He was commander in chief of the British army 1895-1900.

More than once he received the thanks of parliament with money grants added and he was deservedly crowned from time with a long array of honors.

THE BRITISH PRESS ON THE BORDEN POLICY.

Daily Mail, London: "No policy could be more statesmanlike or patriotic than this, nor could it have been proclaimed in nobler or more moving words. They will ring throughout the world as a declaration that the Dominions stand side by side with the Mother Country in the great task of assuring the continuity of the sea—that in this new era of intense and ever-growing naval competition, they are ready and willing and proud to join in bearing the burden of Imperial defence."

Westminster Gazette, London. (Liberal): "The word epoch-making is often used without justification for quite trifling events, but it has a real significance when applied to the announcement which Mr. Borden made in the Dominion House of Commons. We need not say that the people of this country will gratefully welcome some material aid which it offers and for the generous loyalty to the Empire which prompts it."

The Graphic, London: "A thrill of pride will run through the veins of every Englishman as he reads Mr. Borden's speech announcing the determination of his government to ask Canada to give three fully equipped super-Dreadnoughts to the Mother Country. It was a great occasion and a great speech. The need for this aid to the Mother Country is made clear by the Admiralty Memorandum showing the extraordinary growth of withdrawal a large number of vessels from Colonial waters and from the Mediterranean so as to concentrate our naval forces in the North Sea."

The Standard, London: "The speech of Mr. Borden in the Canadian House of Commons marks an epoch in the history of the British Empire, in the history of the world. Canada, as we expected, has risen to the height of her great argument, and through the mouth of her prime minister answers in thunder tones the challenge of those who seek to deprive the British peoples of the supremacy of the sea."

The speech in which Mr. Borden introduced his motion was well worthy of the subject and the occasion.

If the Canadian Parliament accepts it, no doubt it will, Mr. Borden's proposals, we shall enter upon a new era of hope and security and can face the perils of the future with a confidence born of the knowledge that it is not the island kingdom but the world-empire with which the adversaries or assailants of Britain will have to reckon. The mother of the lion-line will indeed be vindicated in her children."

Pall Mall Gazette, London: "Britain looks on them (Canadians) to-day with the loving pride of a mother who beholds her first-born when he shows his shield and the uniform of his regiment or of an Osborne card. Mr. Borden's glowing, yet business-like speech, made clear the reason, the purpose and the aim of the emergency proposals which he laid before Parliament."

"Mr. Borden is himself the most striking example of the untold advantage which the Empire will derive when the wisdom of every Imperial statesman is held at the service of the Empire as a whole. His clear outlook, his imagination, his grasp of essentials, and his driving power were never better displayed than in the speech which moved Parliament to enthusiasm and in the proposals which he so lucidly unfolded to it. We sometimes bewail the lack of a real forceful personality who, in days of peril, would lead the Empire. Perhaps it does not occur to us sufficiently often that the Pitt or Canning of the future may be found, not in these islands, but in Canada or

WIND JAMMERS ARE STOPPED

Argument About Duties of Speakers of the Commons

Result was Victory for Premier Borden and His Party.

OTTAWA, March 26.—The promised attack of the Opposition upon the Speaker of the House for intermeddling during the jousts scene of Saturday, March 15, occupied the most of the time of the House yesterday.

The question on the motion to go into supply, and not by way of resolution, the consequence being that when the discussion ended, at midnight, the House went into supply without a division, and without any position being recorded as to the propriety of the Speaker's action.

The Liberal contention was that the Speaker had no right under the rules to take the chair in the case of grave disorder in Committee of the Whole without a report from the committee, unless a division was taken. The members of the House against this contention it was shown that ample precedents existed for the action of the Speaker.

The Minister of Finance declared that not only did the Speaker act properly and with dignity, but that the thanks of parliament were due him for terminating an unprecedented session.

Rights of the Speaker. Hon. H. R. Emmerson, when the House came to order, recalled that he had proposed to discuss the right of Mr. Speaker to take the chair while the House was in Committee of the Whole, except upon the report of the chairman, or in certain cases to adjourn the House. The rule of the Canadian Commons, he said, provided that the chairman of the Committee of the Whole should maintain order in the committee and decide on questions of order, subject to the appeal to the House. Disorder in the committee, Mr. Emmerson said, could only be censured by the House on a report thereof.

The member for Westmoreland argued that where the Canadian House was not governed by special provisions in its own rules it was amenable to the rules of the British House of Commons, as they were, on July 1, 1867, but that rules adopted in Britain after that date could not be operative in Canada. On Saturday, March 15, Mr. Emmerson said, the Speaker had taken the chair and ordered the chairman to rule that the debate go no further. The Speaker ruled that he had the right to take the chair in cases of grave disorder, and had cited a rule of the British House. Under that rule, contended the Westmoreland member, the Speaker had only two courses of action open to him, either to adjourn the House, or to suspend the sitting for a specified period.

At the same time, Mr. Emmerson contended that rule could have no force in the Canadian Parliament because it had been adopted in Britain since 1867. In the Canadian House of Commons the Speaker could not act without a report from the chairman of the committee; he was a Sphinx, a stone dummy, until he received such report. It was an interference with the committee and with the chairman if the Speaker took the chair and demanded a ruling on a point of order on the ground that it had already been too long discussed.

Mr. Emmerson said that conditions in Canada were quite different from those in the British House of Commons, where the Speaker was a permanent official.

A Difference Noted. Mr. Arthur Meighen (Portage la Prairie) pointed out that the Committee of the Whole House never took action to report the disorder to the House, but that it was only reported after the Speaker had taken the chair. There was a difference in a report of disorder for repression and a Speaker taking the chair to repress disorder.

The member for Portage la Prairie contended that the Speaker could not

"My hon. friend has said that the Government is trying to stop debate," replied Mr. Borden, "and in the same breath has declared that there was a most illuminating debate on the question." The Prime Minister said that when a scene of great disorder was in progress great latitude should be allowed to the Speaker. A condition of grave disorder had existed on Saturday, March 15, and it had been called to the attention of the Speaker. The Speaker had to intervene to restore order. Common sense and the rules of Parliament would dictate that the Speaker should take just the same attitude that he did. The Prime Minister thought that the course pursued by the Speaker was in the interest of the House and of the country, and was sanctioned by precedent and by the dictates of good sense.

This ended the discussion, and the

House went into Committee of Supply.
