## LONG LIST OF BRITISH LEADING SPORTSMEN KILLED AT FRONT

By Courier, Leased Wire  
New York, Aug. 28.—A London cable to The Herald to-day says: The casualties among the leading British sportsmen who have been killed and wounded in action on the western front have now reached alarming proportions, the latest list containing the names of stars in every branch of sport.

Criker has suffered a severe loss by the death in action of Percy Jeeves, a Warwickshire county professional and one of the coming English players. He represented England in the international matches against the South Africans and Australians in 1912.

The Rev. F. H. Tuke, chaplain to the forces, while carrying water to the trenches, was a Cambridge University man and in his varsity days was captain of the first Trinity boat club.

Lieut. K. R. Cooke, who died of wounds in the last Olympic games, was a member of the London Scottish Rugby Football Club, a fine swimmer and with his younger brother went under training, as a

middle distance runner for the Olympic games in 1912.

A well known Southend Harrier, Sergeant W. J. Thorogood also has fallen. He was one of the original members of the famous club and ran in every cross-country team race in which the club competed up to the outbreak of the war. He won the Essex championship in 1908.

Lieut. David N. Gausson, killed in action, was well known in University athletic circles as a long distance runner, having competed in the Oxford and Cambridge sports in 1913 and 1914.

Captain T. G. Brocklebank, an old Etonian, who died of wounds, rowed how for Oxford in the University boat race of 1904.

The Footballers' battalion has done some fine work in the attacks on Delville wood. Captain Bell, the old Southampton Soccer player has been wounded, while William Jones for the Clapton Orient Club, has been killed. The name of E. T. Hanney, a Manchester City and Reading footballer, who was one of the English team in the last Olympic games, appears among the wounded.

## CLAUDE WILLIAMS IS SOME PITCHER


Young Missouri Southpaw, Now With Chicago, Works in Earnest.

## NEWS FROM OVERSEAS

Dundee would appear to be a profitable ground for "conscientious objectors." The Tribunal court, in appeal had a man before it who confessed all war was wrong. "Thou shalt not kill," settled war, or rather war "settled nothing," he said. His appeal was disallowed. Another man wanted his freedom to fight a bigger foe than the German—drugs. He was advised to leave that enemy to the Government. A third man, informed the court that he worked 48 hours a week, and he had saved lives on land and sea, and he was quite willing to go on doing so. But appeal was dismissed. One man was a Roman Catholic, and as such he said to engage in war would be to disobey the Pope. He was allowed exemption, but he would have to go and work at making munitions to kill men. A cinema manager urged that his show was of national importance, but the Chairman did not view it as such, and the picture fellow will have to go into khaki. A student considered that in the interest of education he should be exempted. But he got no sympathy from the matter of fact men who frankly stated that they were out to get as many physically fit men for the army as they could.

"Stands Scotland where she did?" We shall know in a month or two whether she will move with the times or maintain her rugged and traditional regard for the inequality of some things including the "right of women to all the privileges of a full course at the Edinburgh University. The court is arranging to have a full dress debate on the subject. A motion is to be submitted by the Forward School of the Court proposing the abrogation of all distinctions affecting the status of women in the University. An amendment is to be offered accepting the motion with some important strings attached to it. One well known professor has already drawn blood (metaphorically) by asserting that the mechanical progress made by women since the war began proves nothing, and on the merits of the question he would limit the range of women occupations very considerably.

A curious defence was put up by counsel for a prisoner charged with having been a German subject who had failed to notify his change of address while in Edinburgh. He said, arguing for leniency, that his client while a German subject, was nevertheless a man of means, who kept three automobiles, and therefore should not be viewed as likely to convey information to the enemy. The Judge took, however, another view, especially when it came out in evidence that the wealthy German had gone up in an aeroplane without Government sanction, that he occupied a popular hotel in London, and that he was very fond of British officers. The prisoner knew the regulations, and the Judge sentenced him to four months' imprisonment. Some people are asking if there are more Germans with three automobiles in Great Britain.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN HOMESTEAD WEST LAND REGULATION.**  
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Deeds and Land Agency or Sub-Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.  
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years after earning homesteaded patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homesteaded patent, on certain conditions.  
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$250.  
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
