Stows Speaks Well of Boer Prison ers' Condition

Whishington, May 10. - The partment of state is in receipt of a lespatch from the consul-general of the United States at Cape Town, dated April 7, 1900, wherein he states that he has visited the Boer prisoners in camp and on board the transport at Smon's bay, at the military prison at Cape Town, and in camp at Green Point. Mr. Stowe visited Gen. Cronje, who at the time was on board the who at the time was on poard the flagship at S.mon's bay, occupying the edmiral's quarters. Gen. Oronje expressed a wish to see Mr. Stowe, and declared himself well satisfied with his quarters and treatment. Mr. Stowe remarks that he talked freely with the other originals and the universal other prisoners, and the universal statement was that they were well cared for and were satisfied with their cared for and were satisfied with their treatment. They were furnished by the British authorities with clothes, hats and boots; had good sea bathing; the rations of a British soldier, but as they have so many friends and relations in the colony, which the British prisoners at Pretoria lack, they become recipients of many presents of what may be called luxuries in a prisoner's or soldier's life.
