## STOKERS ATTACK OFFICERS.

Rioting Continues At the Portsmouth Naval Barracks.

Portsmouth, Eng., Nov. 7.—The rioting in the naval barracks was resumed at midnight and continued until past 2 o'clock yesterday morning. A gang of several hundred stokers attacked the officers' quarters, assaulting officers, smashing windows and otherwise damaging property. Several policemen who attempted to enforce order were seriously injured.

Armed sailors and marines had to be called out. They overpowered the rioters and made many arrests.

## SECRETS OF THE TEA.

Brave Captains and Hardy Crews Leave Shores of Native Land and Are Swallowed Up By the Ocean.

The sea covers many secrets, but none more mysterious than that of the vessel which sails from a port and is never heard of again. "Missing" is an ominous word on the shipping list, and old salts who note it shake their heads with a sigh as they recall memories of brave captains and hardy crews. Within the last twelve months more than half a dozen good sized craft, among them two deep sailers, have gone to the ocean graveyard.

South street is still talking of the ill-fated Pepe Ramirez, which sailed from New York December 13 last into stout three-masted schooner, built at Columbia Falls, Me., in 1893, and owned by Swan & Son, of 32 South street. She carried a cargo of 600 tons of cement, bound for Brunswick, Ga., where she was to load lumber and return to New York. She had a crew of eight men, and put out on the morning of the 13th with no forebodings on account of the unlucky date, and with every indication of a successful voyage. Five days after she left New York came word that she was missing, and it is supposed that she foundered in one of these.

## His Last Voyage.

Her master was Captain Lorenzo Jordan, who had sailed out of New York for thirty-five years, and was known along the Atlantic seaboard. Just before sailing he announced that it would be his last voyage, as his sixty-two years were weighing upon him, and he wanted to pass the rest of his life in peace and quiet at his old home in Ellsworth, Me., where he was born, and where his widow and two children still live.

It is a curious fact that Mate John Williams, who had been in his service for ten years, was also from Ellsworth; as was the cook, who came down from Ellsworth for this last voyage, which proved to be also his last.

## Strange Coincidence.

Don Pepe Ramirez, a wealthy Spanish sugar planter of Manzanilla, Cuba, for whom the schooner was named, died the same day that it is supposed the vessel went down, and the more superstitious of the South street sailors who knew captain and crew think it is more than a coincidence.

Old salts also call attention to the fact that during the same week the Lejos, a sister ship of the Pepe Ramirez, also built at Ellsworth and bound for New York from Brunswick, was run into by the General Ames of Barnegat and so badly injured that she had to be abandoned. A pilot boat rescued her and now holds her for salvage. The Pepe Ramirez was the fourth vessel that Swan & Son have lost since they began business forty years ago.

## "Don't Leave Us."

One of the strangest stories of this nature is told of the British bark Colombine. This ship was an iron bark, built in Glasgow, in 1865, and one of the largest vessels of her class. She sailed from Newcastle on November 11 last, bound for Algoa Bay on the night of Christmas Eve the Colombine, during a storm, the crew of south-west Australia, near Cape Leeuwin, was in collision with the ship Zinta. The tossing seas threw them apart, and as the vessels were disengaging the captain of the Zinta heard the master of the Colombine shout, "Don't leave us; we're sinking."

## Given Up For Lost.

The Zinta hoisted to, but so dense was the darkness and so heavy the seas that she was totally unable to render any assistance. She stayed in the vicinity of the collision all night, and when daylight broke the crew of the Zinta saw two men clinging to an upturned boat, toward which another boat was being rowed. Sheets of rain then obscured the view, and nothing more of the Colombine was seen, though she might have been close by all the while. She was due at her port three months ago, but nothing further has ever been heard of her. The captain of the Zinta does not think that the Colombine sank as a result of the collision with his ship, describing the impact as very slight, the jibboom of the Zinta merely going through the fore-rigging of the other vessel. The Colombine was posted for reinsurance for a time, but weeks have gone by without further news, and she has now been given up for lost.

## Human Picture Gallery.

A walking portrait gallery has been arrested in Tunis, where he had long been wanted as a deserter. The name of the human picture show is Sarthe. On entering the police-station he removed all his clothing, and said, "Observe my skin. You shan't have it; it is worth its weight in gold." On his chest were tattooed two pictures of ladies, in color, blowing kisses to a cavalier. On his right side Sarthe has the portraits of President Loubet and the Shah of Persia shaking hands. On his left side are Mme. Yvette Guilbert and Mayol, the music-hall singer. Sarthe's back is treated in purely decorative style, rather after the manner of Boucher. Podgy curls are represented in garlands of roses, and a scroll of flowers runs up and down Sarthe's spine.

## School For Policemen.

There is a policeman's college in St. Petersburg to train applicants for the force. It consists of a museum combined with the school, where the pupils make themselves familiar with the tools of criminals—jimmies, drills, collection boxes, a special kind of Russian thieves. The Russian passport system is studied in detail. The duties of the dvorniks, a sort of assistant police, are taught. They keep watch on the residences, report on the habits of tenants, their visitors, examine the papers of new-comers, and direct them to report themselves at the police station.

## English Tare Help Japan.

A statement was issued at Portsmouth of the result of the collection made in the Royal Navy among men of lower deck ratings on behalf of the Japanese famine fund. The total sum raised was £200 and 4 pence, and the odd 4 pence covered the expenditure.

Lumber Mill Employee Fearfully Injured Dies From the Shock.

Perry Sound, Nov. 6.—John Johnson, foreman in the Perry Sound Lumber Co. Mills, had his arm caught while fixing a belt.

He was swung around the revolving shaft fully 100 times before his arm was pulled off.

In addition to the loss of the arm, a foot was cut off and the ankle bones of the leg broken to splinters. He died about an hour later.
