As the official program showed this to be children's day there was not the shadow of an excuse for taking any other.

MANITOULIN

M. Wilson K. C., Chats Entertainingly about the Northern Isle.

M. Wilson, K. C., has returned from Manitoulin. He was very much impressed with the island and has nothing but praise for that north land. "It is a beautiful country," said Mr. Wilson. "We had rain but it hasn't the same bad effect upon the roads that it has here. The state of cultivation of the island and the improvements on the farms is very far in advance of what I expected to see. There is a great deal of magnificent farming land on the island and apparently everybody is prosperous and progressive. The island has township organizations all over it, but the Government stands in the position of the County Council. Needless to say there is no difficulty in securing the concurrence of township councils as well as the grand jury and the court officials to work harmoniously in an endeavor to get everything possible from the Government for the improvement of the court house, jails, leading highways, bridges, etc., which ordinarily would fall under the jurisdiction of the County Council. Brought up under such conditions, one can easily understand why as between the island and the Government the people are led to say that 'Manitoulin is our politics.'"

"The judicial district of Manitoulin includes part of the mainland opposite to and north of the island and the territory is much larger than the island and the towns quite as numerous as in a county in Western Ontario. The judge of the county court has hundreds of miles to travel in taking the various Division Courts, but the roads are fairly good and the water highway is both convenient and enjoyable. The populace is not behind the ordinary country district in Ontario. I am told that the Indians are dying out, but there are still a large number on the island and they both at home and out in the lumber woods seem to be much more inclined to work than they are here."

Gore Bay is the judicial capital of the island, but Little's Creek is much the larger town. The large lumbering interests naturally attract wealthy men to the district and the mill owners distribute enormous sums of money in wages to be spent in the district. There are many saw mills which employ thousands of men in rafting, cutting and shipping logs. These mills have practically all come to this district since the export duty was placed upon logs sent to the United States. The effect of that duty was to make the mill owners transfer their place of business from the United States to Ontario and thereby give to thousands of employers labor at high wages and to distribute amongst Ontario citizens immense sums of money as well as to give the local municipalities the benefit of the taxes upon the mill properties. When one thinks of the great change in this respect arising from simply putting an export duty on logs, he can hardly estimate what has been lost to the Province of Ontario by the Government refraining from imposing that duty 20 years previously.

In driving through the country I went past the beautiful residence of Mr. R. R. Cameron, M. P. P., near Gore Bay. It is built as several others are in that neighborhood, with cement walls. Strange to say, I heard many complaints in that lumber

district of the great expense of frame buildings. Most of the brick used is imported, but a brick kiln is about to be started at Gore Bay and a company has been organized for the manufacture of cement."
