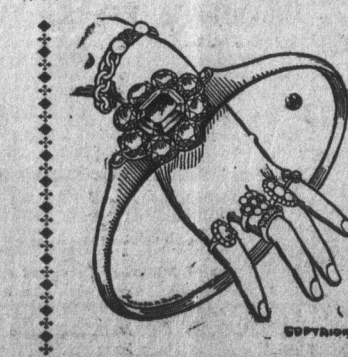

The United States Express Company have notified their agents, Brisco Bros., that all donations in the way of money or clothing for the earthquake sufferers will be carried free of charge to San Francisco over their lines.

Mrs. Robert Fisher, of Otham Township, received a telegram from her brother, John Butler, San Francisco, on Sunday, to say that his family were safe. Mr. Butler has been a resident of that city for many years.

Prayers were offered up for those afflicted through the earthquake in San Francisco in all of the city churches. Rev. F. E. Malott, of Victoria avenue Methodist church, preached a special sermon on the event.

In a contributed report which appeared in this journal, it was stated that fifteen loaves of bread had been donated by the Canadian Foresters. It should have been stated that the donation was made by the Independent Order of Oddfellows.

LICENSES GRANTED

The East Kent License Commissioners met in the Town Hall, Ridge town, on Friday afternoon. Applications were received from A. Walker, of Charing Cross, for the ensuing year, which was represented by his son David Walker, who presented to the Commissioners a certificate signed by 68 ratepayers. These signatures were attacked by R. L. Gosnell, of Blenheim, in behalf of the temperance people, and seven names were disqualified. In behalf of the certificates twelve names were submitted as possible additions, but in any event a majority of the voters on the list were represented. A resolution was passed granting Arthur Walker a license for the ensuing year.

Similar certificates were presented in behalf of Alex. Forbes, of Cedar Springs, for a license, and his request was also granted.

A. M. Vestor, of Blenheim, was granted an extension of three months and a certificate in behalf of J. Flewelling, of Charing Cross, was presented, but was too late and was not considered.

All of the other applicants were granted licenses.

THE LICENSE COMMISSIONERS

Continued from Page One.

The Commissioners resumed at 1.30. A largely signed petition asking that permission be granted for the establishment of a colored hotel in the city was presented by Mr. S. B. Arnold.

The first matter considered was the granting of four hotel licenses in Wallaceburg to Messrs. P. W. Glaab, Michael O'Mara, John O'Mara, D. Kinna.

The inspector's reports were favorable to the granting of licenses in each case. Some slight improvements in the lavatory systems of two of the hotels was suggested.

It was moved by Mr. Rankin, seconded by Mr. Drew, that the Wallaceburg licenses be granted.—Carried.

Messrs. Austin, Westman and others appeared in connection with the petition for the colored hotel, begging time to consider the matter before reporting on the same.

The three Tilbury hotels, of which the proprietors are B. Belord, Mr. Mahew and J. Louges, were favorably reported on by the inspector.

The licenses were granted in each case.

Applications for licenses in Dover were received from A. Cheff, Pain Court; N. Carter, Mitchell's Bay; O. Brown, Mitchell's Bay; D. Gagnier, Pain Court; G. McIntyre and Z. Emery, 8th concession.

The following were favorably reported on by the inspector: A. Cheff, D. Gagnier, G. McIntyre and Z. Emery. These were granted licenses.

The other two were given one month's extension of license to comply with regulations, and if not in proper condition by that time their licenses will be cut off.

Thomas Redpath, of Tupperville, applied for license. The inspector reported that the proprietor had been convicted once but otherwise the report was favorable.

The Commissioners withdrew for a few moments to consider the granting of this license in private.

On resuming the chairman reported that they had decided that no licenses be granted to Thomas Redpath, of Tupperville, or William Rose, of Chatham Township.

The Chatham City licenses were next taken up. It was stated that legally 14 licenses could be granted in Chatham.

Applications were received from Jos. J. Carron, Grand Central; Peter Toulouse, Park House; John Glasford, Glasford House; John Plegance, Rankin House; D. J. McDonald, C. P. R.; E. A. Bechard, Aberdeen; J. W. Miles, Shakespeare House; Richards & McCoig, Garnd House; Hogan & Hoy, Montana House; N. Courtney, Courtney House; Jos. Yacht, Montana House; John Dunlop, Idlewild; Nora Mount, Klondyke; F. Merrill, Merrill House; Ethel Fairbanks, Tecumseh House; Mr. Carter, Carter House; and Dunn & Lee for the colored hotel.

The reputation present were heard with regard to the granting of a license to Dunn & Lee, for a colored hotel in Chatham.

Mr. Westman, representing the temperance people, said that the grounds taken by them one year ago, was that only nine hotel licenses should be granted in Chatham.

The Council had finally decided on fourteen licenses by law. If the temperance people did not think their wishes had received proper consideration, they believed that in fairness the Commissioners should bring the number of licenses down to nine.

The License Commissioners went the full limit of fourteen hotel licenses the temperance people would at once institute a local option campaign.

He claimed that there were certain city hotels which were not supplying proper accommodation. He, as the temperance people objected to the granting of a license for a colored hotel, as such was not needful in Chatham. The building was not in sanitary condition and not a fit place for a hotel.

Rev. Mr. Rutledge, representing the Ministerial Association, objected to an increase in the number of city hotel licenses. The he said, could mention certain houses in the city which should be cut off. The association would have the Commissioners reduce the number of licenses.

The association was unanimous in their opposition to the granting of a license for a colored hotel, as such would not be in the interests of the colored people. The association would resort to extreme measures if their wishes were not considered.

The meeting is still in progress at the time of going to press.

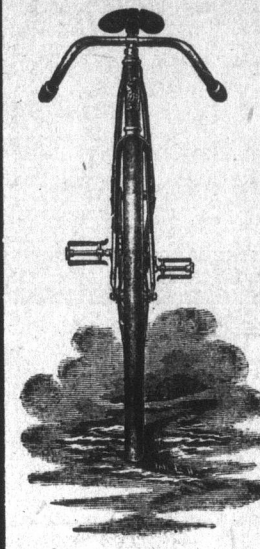

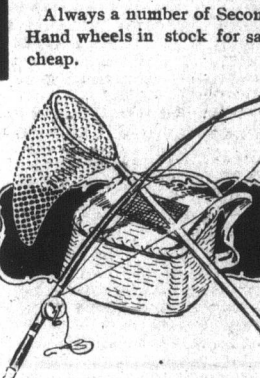
