HOW TO BUILD UP WOLFVILLE

Building a community is everybody's job. The home owner, the landlord, the merchant, the housewife, the minister, the doctor, the school principal, the school board, the civic authorities—in fact, everyone with a distinct home interest must play his part.

The local newspaper is the point of contact through which these various elements must function and express themselves. The home town publication is a mirror of the life of the community, inspiring, suggesting, helping and usually sacrificing a great deal to the general work of upbuilding.

It is amazing to note how slow is the average newspaper reader to appreciate the value of frank and open newspaper advertising. Not only in this way is the housewife enabled to learn what the market has to offer, but in the frank open advertisement lies an absolute security from exploitation.

COMMUNITY RESPONSIBILITY

A very lamentable lack of interest in the matter of community affairs is evident at the present time. This condition is not peculiar to any particular section but appears to be a product of present day living, which is common to every sphere of activity.

The field of athletics has undergone a transformation that is equally as significant as is business conditions. When our fathers attended school the games which they played were participated in by all, but today there is a "team" which monopolizes activities while their fellows watch and applaud or criticize.

The method of discharging our public duties by proxy is one not calculated to promote community interests to any great extent, and should be replaced by the desire on the part of every citizen to shoulder his full share of responsibility in all matters relating to the support of public institutions and the promotion of community prosperity.

HOME-MADE GOODS

Propos the discussion of the proposal in favor of a more general use of commodities of our own production in these Maritime Provinces it may be remarked that the tendency in the opposite direction is too much in evidence. This is true not only as it relates to the purchase of products of other lands by these provinces at large but of the inhabitants of sections within the provinces as well.

To make a local application it should not be necessary that in this fertile Annapolis Valley a simple article such as ice-cream should be supplied by Halifax, Truro and other makers. When properly made and not spoiled by harmful adulterations ice-cream provides a wholesome and nourishing food, the generous use of which might very properly be encouraged.

SMILE AT THE WORLD

It isn't difficult to discover greater sorrow than we experience ourselves. But that doesn't mean that we should go around seeking it so that we may have something against which to loose our wrath. The difficulty with the most of us is that we never know how fortunate we are and further more don't wish to be told. PAYS HIGH TRIBUTE TO LATE CHIEF JUSTICE

BRIDGETOWN, June 19.—When the Supreme Court opened at Bridgetown yesterday, Mr. Justice Ritchie made the following remarks:

"Sir Charles Townshend is to be buried today. Since his death he has been much in my mind and the day of his funeral is an appropriate time for me to pay my tribute to his memory. When I came to the Bench twelve years ago, it was my good fortune that Sir Charles was Chief Justice. I entertained for him feelings of sincere regard and respect and it was therefore a great pleasure to me to serve under him. Sir Charles was an ideal Chief Justice; his dignity and courtesy on the bench were unflinching; he was an able and sound lawyer, and a lasting tribute to his legal ability will be found in the reports of the Supreme Court of Canada, as his judgments were very seldom reversed.

For the past four years he was my near neighbour at Wolfville, and a friendship which had existed between us for years became closer. His death came to me as a personal loss. A great judge and a cultured Christian gentleman has gone to the reward of the just."

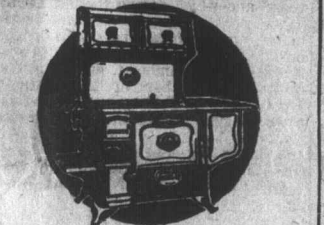
The first few innings were very good ball, but in the closing inning the locals went in the air and allowed runs to come in on errors.
