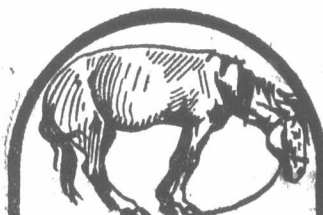

## CLUB FORMED FOR WOODSTOCK BOYS

The male students of the public schools and of the Carleton county Vocational school of Woodstock have formed a club under the direction of S. C. Heckbert, instructor in manual training and farm mechanics at the vocational school, for the purpose of operating an open air rink, maintaining recreation and reading rooms, and for the erection of a camp in the woods near the town, all with the idea of promoting clean sport in the town which, at the present time, has little recreation to offer the boys, being without a covered rink and a gymnasium. 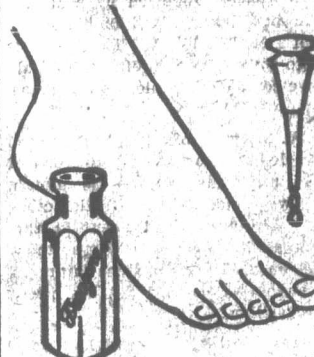

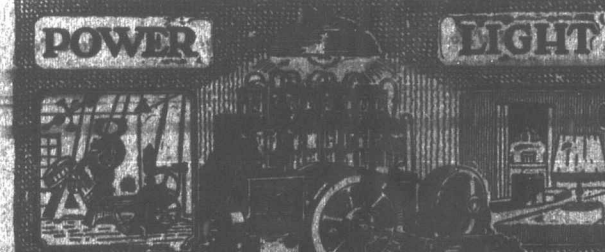
