Member of Steamer's Crew Sheriff Robinson was in town or Swims to Drifting Barge

with a Life Line

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec 7-Captain Larsen, of the steamship Florida, reports that through the bravery of a member of his crew five men were rescued from what seemed to be impending death.

.The Florida left Port Arthur, Texas, on November 16th towing the barge Providence, loaded with 1,300,000 gallons of crude oil in bulk. Heavy gales were encountered all the way to Cape Hatteras, Then Captain Mias Ida Menard of New Carlisle and Larsen attempted to shorten his tow Miss Victoria Couillard of Carleton lines. Both hawsers parted and the

barge was adrift. After two hours' battle the barge was picked up. Capt. Larsen, believing that his tow would break away any moment, called for a volunteer to make the hazardous journey from the ship to the barge by means of the towing line.

A sailor responded. Ropes were fastened to his body and he started hand over hand toward the harge. He made the journey safeiy, The ropes he carried with him were fastened around the men on the barge and each were hauled aboard the ship the unknown rescurer being the last to be hauled aboard the Florida. The barge was then cut adrift.
