THANKSGIVING ATTRACTION.

Clyde Fitch, in his master fashion, endowed the three acts with scenes and dialogue up to the minute, and the entire play has so much youth and cleverness that it is appreciated by all classes of theatregoers. RAILWAY SOLD.

Not Thought That Hamilton People Are Interested.

London, Ont., Oct. 21.—The South-Western Traction Company, running from London to St. Thomas and Port Stanley, was sold yesterday by public auction for \$335,000. The purchasers were the London Stock Company, a group of capitalists from Toronto, Hamilton and London. J. L. McDougall, T. H. Purdon, of this city, were their representatives.

Other would-be purchasers were the Royal Securities Company, of Montreal, and the London Street Railway. It was announced after the sale that the line would extend branches to Aylmer and Delaware. The actual bid was \$455,000, but the purchaser has to bear liens of about \$80,000. The new company will take over the road before Christmas and elect their officers. The present staff will be continued.

The railway is about 28 miles in length, connecting London with Port Stanley, on Lake Erie, passing through the city of St. Thomas. About 14 miles is built on private right of way, including entrance into London. The remainder is on public highways. The railway is well constructed and equipped.

The Canadian Westinghouse Company, Limited, claimed a lien amounting to \$56,671, on electrical equipment supplied to the railway company; the Preston Car and Coach Company, a lien of six passenger cars, amounting to \$19,411.38, and the J. G. Brill Company a lien on four pairs of trucks amounting to \$1,643.92 or thereabouts.

Representatives of the Canadian Westinghouse Company, of this city, the company's solicitor and treasurer, attended the sale, and are of opinion that no Hamilton people are connected with the Hamilton people, which was the successful bidder.

MONEY DEAR.

Bank of England Discount Rate Now Five Per Cent.

London, Oct. 21.—The Bank of England to-day raised its minimum rate of discount another full point to five per cent., the highest it has stood since the American flurry of 1907. This is the third consecutive week that the directors of the bank have considered it necessary to strengthen the barriers against a further leakage of gold reserves.

The international monetary position shows no material improvement during the past week, and the bank's reserve, which is now nearing the \$110,000,000 mark, is threatened with a further depletion this week by the South American

and Egyptian requirements, which are estimated at \$7,500,000.

Foreign exchanges have been steadily against London, particularly Berlin, where gold is badly needed, and where the need arrival of the metal would probably have gone, but for the imposition of the five per cent. rate. It is known that requirements from other countries would soon reduce the reserve to below \$100,000,000, unless the new rates attracts gold. The market sees in today's raise a general warning against the speculative operations and the announcement was followed by a dropping in prices. British securities and Kafir recovered almost immediately, but American shares which earlier in the day were above parity, fell away. U. S. Steel and Union Pacific dropping 3-4, and several others a half with the tone generally weak.
