Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 21 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-agency of the district. Entry of proof may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homesteaded entry (including the time required to earn homesteaded patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has vacated the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may re-apply for homesteaded land in certain cases. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

BIG GAME.

Mr. Roosevelt Kills His First Hippopotamus.

But, we got within half a mile of McMillan's house without seeing a hippo, and the light was rapidly fading. Judd announced that we would go home, but took one last look around the next bend, and instantly sank to his knees, backslapping to me. I crept forward on all-fours, and he pointed out to me an object in the stream, fifty yards off, under the overhanging branch of a tree, which jutted out from the steep bank opposite.

In that light I should not myself have recognized it as a hippo head; but it was one, looking toward us, with the ears up and the nostrils, eyes, and backslapping to me. I aimed for the centre; the sound told that the bullet had struck somewhere on the head, and the animal disappeared without a splash. Judd was sure I had killed, but I was by no means so confident myself, and there was no way of telling until next morning, for the hippo always sinks when shot and does not rise to the surface for several hours.

Accordingly, back we walked to the house. At sunrise next morning Cunningham, Judd and I, with a crowd of porters, were down at the spot. There was a very leaky boat in which Cunningham, Judd, and I embarked, intending to drift and paddle downstream while the porters walked along the bank. We did not have far to go, for as we rounded the first point we heard the porters break into guttural exclamations of delight, and there ahead of us, by a little island of papyrus, was the dead hippo. With the help of the boat it was towed to a convenient landing-place, and then the porters dragged it ashore. It was a cow of good size for one dwelling in a small island, where they never approach the dimensions of those making their homes in a great lake like the Victoria Nyanza. This one weighed nearly two thousand eight hundred pounds, and I could well believe that a big lake bull would weigh between three and four tons.

In wild regions hippos rest on sandy bars, and even come ashore to feed, by day; but wherever there are inhabitants they land to feed only at night.—From "African Game Trails" by Theodore Roosevelt in the January Scribner.

BARONESS BANISHED.

Belgium Will Not Tolerate Her Presence, Now King is Dead.

No Record of Alleged Religious Ceremony Has Yet Been Found.

Princess Louise Received With Royal Honors.

Brussels, Dec. 20.—Baroness Vaughan, whom Leopold made his queen in fact if not in name, secretly left Belgium to-day, accepting the hint of the Government that if she did not depart voluntarily she would be expelled.

The baroness packed up those magnificent furnishings of her chateau which were the personal gifts of King Leopold and sent them across the frontier.

To the Belgians she was always a great mystery, but they accepted her as they had the other whims of the determined and self-willed King. Yet now, with the King dead, they have been driven to deep resentment, that as the King's body was borne through the streets and was lying in state at the palace, her photograph was exhibited and sold in the Brussels thoroughfares and her name shouted out by hawkers as "Caroline the Queen."

In spite of despatches from Italy and other countries, asserting that King Leopold and the baroness had been married according to the rites of the church, the King's personal friends persist in their disbelief, and they say the stories of a civil union are nonsense. They say that Leopold, whatever his fault in private life, would never destroy the official dignity of the kingdom.

M. Rallis, also an ex-Premier, joined the Protestants and left the house. The sitting was suspended in disorder.

M. Tholokis later interviewed Premier Mavromichalis and declared that he would demand the resignation of the Minister of War, under the threat that a majority of the chamber would abstain from taking part in the sittings.

The semi-official Twentieth Century points out that the Belgian code stipulates that the rights of succession to the throne pass to direct descendants of legitimate birth. If there was a civil marriage in Italy, it might create potential rights, but it is argued, the absence of all records, all publication of such a ceremony, and especially the fact that Leopold never proclaimed Baroness Vaughan his legitimate wife, effectually disposes of the question.

Prince Albert's plan to reunite the exiled and separated family was fulfilled to-day. As Baroness Vaughan passed out forever from Belgium, Princess Louise triumphantly entered the city and was officially greeted at the station and acclaimed by the people.

She was conducted with royal honors to the Chateau Belvedere, which henceforth will be her official home.

Again to-day a vast crowd viewed the body of the late King. Many of the people who came in from the provinces were incensed that the gates were closed at 3 o'clock, and they tried to force an entrance. In the panic, people were trodden on and a number were injured. Finally, the palace was reopened and the visitors were allowed to file past the catafalque.

Arrangements for the funeral and the swearing in of the new sovereign are proceeding rapidly. An army of workmen has taken possession of the cathedral, which is being draped, and the Chamber of Deputies is being rearranged for the ceremonies.

When Albert will triumphantly enter Brussels on horseback. Delegations are arriving from the European courts. The United States will be represented by Henry Lane Wilson, the Minister to

Belgium, and U. G. Smith, the new secretary, who will arrive here to-morrow from Santiago.

BARONESS SILENT. Paris, Dec. 20.—The Baroness Vaughan, accompanied by a single woman companion, arrived here from Brussels this evening. When she alighted from a train at the northern station, she was thickly veiled, but was recognized at once by a crowd of photographers, who snapped her as she passed through the gates. She was surrounded by reporters, who besieged her with questions. To them she said: "I cannot tell you anything at present. Please do not insist. I do not know as yet what I am going to do."

Hastening to a taxicab she drove rapidly to the western station, where she entered a train for Pontoise. There an automobile was in waiting and in it she was whirled to the chateau, which had been put in readiness for her comfort. Her children are there.

NO TRACE OF MARRIAGE. Paris, Dec. 20.—A despatch to the Matin from San Remo says that inquiries at all churches fail to discover any traces of King Leopold's marriage with Baroness Vaughan.

MARRIED AT BOBBIERE. Paris, Dec. 21.—A man employed on Leopold's Cape Ferrat estate told the Matin's Nice correspondent that he accompanied King Leopold and Baroness Vaughan in an automobile to the Franciscan Chapel at Bobbierre in February, 1908, where, he asserts, a marriage as celebrated. The superior of the Franciscans, when seen by the correspondent, refused either to confirm or deny this statement.

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
