An adjourned meeting of the conference was held Friday morning to complete the work of organization and adopt further resolutions relative to the permanent success of the organization.

FINANCIAL
Mr. Douglas K. Clarke, Superintendent of the Maritime Provinces, N. B., gave a summary of the general economic conditions in the Maritime Provinces.

The grand finale of the conference in the evening was attended by an immense gathering of the delegates, and local citizens who came to hear the excellent speeches and to add their quota to the success of this great forward movement.

It was a patriotic meeting from the start to the finish. The hall itself was beautifully decorated with Union Jacks and the emblematic colors associated with national patriotism.

Mr. Geo. R. Cutler, President of Acadia University, and who is also an Amherst boy, was welcomed by his many local friends as chairman for the evening.

Dr. Cutler opened the meeting with a few brief introductory remarks. He then introduced as the first speaker the Prime Minister of Canada, the Right Hon. Sir Robert L. Borden, who was given an enthusiastic welcome, and whose address will be given in full next issue.

Stirring speeches were also delivered by Premier Murray, of Nova Scotia, Premier Matheson of P. E. I., Hon. C. W. Robinson of Moncton, a splendid patriotic address by the Very Rev. Dean Lloyd, of A. I. Saint's cathedral, Halifax, Major General Hughes, and at the close by E. N. Rhodes, M. P., who in an appropriate speech moved a vote of thanks to the distinguished speakers who came to Amherst to address the conference.

The motion was seconded by H. J. Logan, K. C., and the gathering was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.
