HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

WEST MINING REGULATIONS. Coal.-Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per cre. Not more than 2,560 acres thall be leased to one individual or Not more than 2,560 acres company. A royalty at the rate on the merchantable coal mined. Quartz.-A person eighteen years of age, or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1.500 x 1.500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with othe requirements, purchase one land at \$1 per acre.
