To test Solgnum as a preservative for wood against the at-tacks of Worms, we tried a bieve of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solgnum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, imme-diately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken what (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off in for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time found some half-dozen small holes only a very short dista-in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had pe trated through the whole piece and the worms had I begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends. leaving the centre third clean; this was in exactly the place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect the centre was riddled with worm holes.
