A Live Week.

Mr. Garvin, the former Irish Nationalist, now the Tory will of the wisp, who led the peers into the political bog over the Finance Bill, is out again urging the peers to resist the Asquith Bill to the death. The trouble he led them into on the occasion referred to should be ample warning to mind their steps. He threatens the Tory party with dissolution and Mr. Balfour with desertion should his advice be disregarded. A few days will unfold what is to be done. On this side the water, the Reciprocity Bill is through Congress and President Taft is happy, and now waits to see what his Canadian friends can do. The Conservative party of Canada declares that Reciprocity will not be allowed to pass there without a reference to the electorate. It will be seen that a general election of Canada is talked of for the early fall, and that is to be settled this week.

Called on the Administrator.

His Excellency the Papal Delegate accompanied by His Grace Archbishop Howley, Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche and Monsignor Sinnott called on His Excellency the Administrator Sir William Horwood at the Government House this morning at 10.30. Sir William acting on behalf of Governor Williams, received the distinguished party in a most gracious manner. The party was preceded by Aide de Camp V. P. Burke and F. Summers in another carriage. We understand that Sir William will give a dinner to the Papal Delegate and party on Wednesday evening next.

Boy Nearly Drowned.

Master Donald Kelloway, the 8-year old son of Mr. J. Kelloway, mate of the S. S. Fogota, had a narrow escape from drowning at Perry's Cove, Bay-de-Verde District, last Wednesday. He fell off a rock in the land wash into deep water. His uncle was called by a little girl who saw the boy struggling, he came to the place and assisted by two bank fishermen who were there succeeded in rescuing the boy. They thought he was dead, but the bankers who were well up in "first aid" worked on the lad for four hours and finally brought him to. He is all right now.

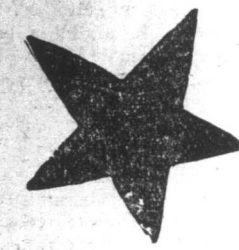
The poor woman's face, when it dawned upon her that her vanishing tea trick had been discovered, was a study.
