**German Navy to be Made Stronger.**

BERLIN, To-day. The possibility of measures for strengthening the navy or the army or both being submitted to the next Reichstag, as a result of the international crisis of last summer is arousing most intense interest in the press and among the public. The election for the Reichstag takes place in January. Until now not the slightest indication of the intention of the Government in the matter has been evoked. According to an apparently authoritative statement in the Boersen Zeitung yesterday, however, the navy and not the army is to be the chief beneficiary of the new programme. The army at the same time will also figure, although to a smaller extent in the appropriations asked for.

**Canadian Coasting Privileges.**

SYDNEY, To-day. It is learned that Canadian coasting privileges for foreigners, which were to have been cancelled at the end of December, have been extended for a further period of two years. Nothing official in regard to the matter has been announced, but it is understood that an extension of coasting privileges in Canadian waters has been granted, and that this would include Norwegian steamers and others in the Sydney and St. Lawrence coasting trade.

**Portuguese Crown Jewels.**

LISBON, To-day. The Portuguese government has decided that the jewels found in the Royal Palaces after the flight of King Manuel and his relatives do not belong to the deposed monarch, as at first supposed, but are the property of the Republic.

NASSAU, Bahama Islands, To-day. An unknown French bark is reported to have been seen on fire near Long Island. She sank in 8 fathoms. The fate of the crew is unknown.

**Poker Game Lasted 4 Days.**

New York, Dec. 2.—The passengers on the White Star liner Cedric, which arrived to-day, were full of gossip of a poker game which started in the smoke-room on Tuesday night and lasted until the ship was off the Ambrose lightship last night. It was altogether a friendly game and nobody who even looked like a third cousin of a professional gambler was allowed to break into it. There was never a moment of the four days and four nights when seven men were not in the game.

The winners were Paul Wilkes, a California oil millionaire, and A. L. Dunham, a mining magnate. The rest lost. Mr. Wilkes won about \$1,500, and Mr. Dunham about \$100.

The joke of the game was that the big hands were held by the two winners. On Thursday morning, early, the limit was raised from \$10 to \$25; the ante had been \$10 all along. Mr. Dunham found four queens smiling at him from his hand and promptly boosted the pot. Mr. Wilkes, who had counted out four aces among his five cards, was not a bit bashful about going right back at him. Others stayed in until there was \$700 in the pot. After that the oil and the gold man had it all to themselves.
