Send Out Your GOLD!

Four years ago the People's Party waded great on what they were going to do for Agriculture, should the reins of Government be handed over to them. They were going to cut the flour barrel in two, hay was to be abundant and turned into a plentiful supply of home raised and red beef, the hills were to be whitened with sheep which would be converted into a good and wholesome abundance of mutton, potatoes and other vegetables were to be plentiful and cheap, and most of the gold which we were told went abroad to pay for an excessive consumption of flour by the people and the large quantities of meat and vegetables imported would be kept at home. This in principle is all right, but what about the policy which was to convert the principle into practice. What good has come of it all after three years expenditure of large sums of money by the Department in charge of the Government policy? To-day the Acting Secretary of the Board of Agriculture is spending his time on the potato canker which has struck the country and threatens to destroy or seriously curtail our local supply of potatoes, a form of Agriculture which our people excel. The result therefore will be that after four seasons of the Morris Agricultural policy we shall have to send more gold than ever out of the country to buy foreign potatoes. Then again we find that the hay crop is shorter than ever, due of course to the inclement season, but in no material way has the shortage due to that cause been supplemented to cope with the serious situation which now confronts the country. The Government now finds instead of keeping gold in the country, it has to take the duty off hay to induce the people to send their gold abroad in greater quantities than ever to bring in foreign hay that milch cow keepers and horse-owners may keep their cattle alive during the coming winter. There is now no room to talk of converting a large excess of hay, over and above what is wanted for these purposes, into meat that people may be fed on local raised beef. These are facts which stare the country in the face at the present time after, as we have already mentioned, four summer seasons of the Morris Agricultural policy. Money has been spent profusely and to little or no effect. Even the Placeman's Act was amended in order to allow salaries to be given to members of the House of Assembly, as Commissioners of Agriculture. A small army of paid Secretaries of Agricultural Societies have been appointed. There have been givings-out in profusion of stock and seed. But what good has come of it all? The country is heart sick of the waste and lack of results from the Morris expenditure of money. The foundations of what was

LONDON, To-day.
The war is expected to develop into a land campaign between Bulgaria and Turkey and into a naval struggle between Turkey and Greece. It is believed Turkey will concentrate her strength on an attack on the Bulgarians separately, before the Servians can come to her aid. Much will depend on whether Turkey gains command of the sea, which would facilitate the transfer of her Asiatic troops to the theatre of war. The news of actual fighting is conflicting. The Turks claim substantial victories over the Montenegrins. The Greek people are rejoicing over their first naval victory by two gunboats forcing Prevesa Strait. This feat gives the Greeks command of the Gulf of Arta and secures a supply of stores for Dpirus.

MEDICINE HAT, To-day.
Mrs. Polosky who lost her husband and child recently through typhoid and became unsettled in mind through grief and through complications in regard to the possession of her home-stand, murdered her two children, aged five and three, with a carving knife, and then turned the weapon onto herself, committing suicide. The family are Polish emigrants.

OTTAWA, To-day.
Hon. F. D. Monk's position with regard to the naval policy of the Government has been the subject of much speculation. While no official statement can be procured, it is understood that Monk is convinced that the situation which confronts the Empire at this juncture is grave and even critical, but he is earnest, and even insistent, in his opinion that no assistance should be given by Canada, even as an emergency contribution, without referring the question to the people.

OTTAWA, To-day.
The proposed visit to Canada of Winston Churchill is apparently abandoned. It is known here that it is not coming unless unofficially and that in view of the present European situation, such a visit is improbable.

HALIFAX, To-day.
A despatch to Hon. F. D. Monk has resigned and that his resignation has been accepted.

TURK'S ISLAND, To-day.
The French schooner, Curieuse, from Miquelon for Turk's Island in ballast, was wrecked at Calcos Island. The crew were saved.

Is There a Second Wreck?

By the schr. Reliance, Chas. Chalk, master, which arrived here yesterday from Clode Sound, we learn that on Tuesday last they sighted a schooner partly under water about 7 miles S. E. of Green Island. The Reliance launched a boat and the men went up to and examined the wreck but could not discern the name. These same men saw the schooner reported by the "Gower" S. on that same evening at the north side of Baccalieu Island. The schr. Rosie from Deer Island saw a wrecked schooner 10 miles N. N.E. of Baccalieu on the same day. The description of the wreck tallies with the account published elsewhere. One particular feature was that her foremast was newly roped and a good deal of new canvas was worked into it.

Will Probably Recover.

We are pleased to hear that Dr. Gutaro, of Bell Island, writes, that Miss Eva Martin who was unconscious for a week from a fall, will probably recover. She was brighter yesterday and talked quite a bit. Every attention and everything that can possibly be supplied by loving friends has been given. It is hoped she may be well enough to move from her sister's residence to St. John's before the colder weather comes. Miss Martin is but eighteen, and it is a mercy the accident was not fatal.

How She Sank.

From crafts which arrived from Salmoner yesterday we learn that the schooner Native Lass, owned by M. McDonald, and to which reference has already been made in a message from that place, turned completely over in that harbour in a gale of S. W. wind, Sunday morning. The vessel was very light with no cargo on board and dragged from her anchors when William Waddleton and two other men boarded her and the mast and rigging came on her to bring her down the harbour to safer anchorage. They had not gone 100 yards when a sudden squall hit her and she went over to the starboard in a few seconds. The men quickly clambered up on the port side, hauled up the dory swinging aft and jumped into her. They were none too soon for when they reached the dory she went completely over upright again and then filled and sank. Yesterday with the aid of a gang of men and two schooners she was refloated.

Bulgarian Premier Talks.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, To-day.
Premier Gureshoff has issued a statement on the attitude of Turkey, saying their pride ill accords with the miserable role played by the European concert. Turkey has just declared that the Note of the three Balkan States does not merit an answer. The Premier characterizes this as comical in view of Lord Salisbury's definition at Berlin that Turkey was dependent upon the Powers for protection for its existence. He adds also that Turkey accuses the Balkan States of lack of deference to the great Powers, and says it is ridiculous that the Government which since the Crimean War has done nothing but trample under foot its pledges to the great Powers, upon which it depends for protection, should accuse us of failure to show respect for its protection.

Lost a Man.

Seaman J. Sears Goes to Death. Messrs. Baine Johnstone & Co. are in receipt of a message from Captain Wilson, of the barque Lake Simcoe, stating that the vessel reached her destination, Pernambuco, after a very stormy and eventful trip of forty days from this port, and also conveying the intelligence that seaman John Sears had died on the passage. The message did not state how he met his death. Deceased was a young man of twenty-three years of age and had been living with a relative in the city, his parents being dead. He was an ex-pupil of the Mount Cashel Industrial Home, and the teachers at that Institution will be sorry to hear of his untimely death. This morning Rev. F. O'Callaghan was communicated with by the owners of the vessel and borne the sad news to the bereaved relatives of the young seaman.
