## S.U.F. Patriotic Lecture Last Night

STIRRING APPEALS MADE.

The first of the series of Patriotic Lectures of the course, which will be given under the auspices of the St. John's Lodge, S. U. F., was the object of setting forth the seriousness of the great European conflict took place at the British Hall last night before a large gathering.

His Excellency the Governor and Lady Davidson, under whose patronage the meeting was held, attended and on arrival were received and welcomed by the S. U. F. Officers, while Mr. J. J. Slattery, who presided at the piano, rendered the British and Freesch National Anthems. Mr. J. M. Kent, K.C., M. H. A., and Mr. J. W. Withers were also present.

Mr. J. A. Clift, K.C., Grand Master of the Lodge, fulfilled the duties of Chairman and made a happy speech. He expressed the hope that the other forty-two branches, with an aggregate membership of about 3,700 would take the cue and have similar gatherings. No time should be lost and every effort made to enable our people to get a grasp of conditions as they really are, and what led up to this serious war, to encourage recruiting and to set forth the duties we, as British subjects, owe to our King and Country. The true spirit of loyalty and patriotism should be bedded in every heart now and the speaker felt sure that if this was done Newfoundland would not be lacking in proving a worthy member of the Empire. The Chairman then introduced Mr. A. B. Morine, who treated his audience to a most interesting discourse, expounding the whole situation. Britain only acted in self-defence, began the lecturer. The assassination of the Austrian heir was used by Germany as a pretext for war. The attitude of the Russian nation was not an aggressive one. They mobilized to protect themselves. The annexation of Bosnia by Austria was objectionable, yet the latter declared war, because Germany forced her on. In pursuance of her doctrine that "might is right" and in accordance with the motto "Domination or Nightfall," Germany made a most unjustifiable invasion of Belgium. A review of the commercial advances of Germany was then given, her efforts to build up an Empire in Africa and her gigantic efforts towards the building of a navy to destroy England. But Great Britain's navy was never better prepared to maintain her supremacy on the seas. Britain was most anxious for peace in all her negotiations, prior to the declaration of war, and now she was in Germany was going to be the victim of her own arrogance. Continuing, the speaker then reviewed some of Britain's great statesmen whose work will become historical, such as the diplomacy of Grey, the financing of Lloyd George, the conduct of naval matters by Churchill and the statesmanship of Asquith were all dwelt upon. He also spoke of Kitchener and Jellicoe as worthy of special note and also of the deeds of some of the French and Russian Generals. The speaker graphically portrayed the work of the British Navy which was effectively protecting the seas and by her efforts was protecting her own as well as neutral shipping and enabling us to carry on our commercial and industrial activities. Victory for Britain, said Mr. Morine, will result in a more united Empire. He thought that some form of conscription would be adopted when the war is over and emphasized that what we are doing for Britain in the shape of sending volunteers was only partial payment for the protection Britain is giving us. We should do our best to help in the great struggle so that when the history of the war is written, Newfoundland will be said to have done her part. In conclusion, the speaker advocated more patriotic teaching in our schools.

Mr. W. J. Higgins followed, and in a stirring address contrasted the spirit which animated the soldiers of Germany and Britain. To the former army, the gospel of might has been preached, while the motto of the British soldier is Right. Britain's representatives had made every possible attempt to preserve peace, but would not accept it on Germany's terms, since it would mean the sacrifice of the honor of the Empire. Grey's efforts towards peace, and the stout refusal of Germany's terms for the neutrality of Belgium, which meant the sacrifice of France will be recorded in the pages of history.

He then went on to summarize the causes that led up to the war, and compared the attack of Germany upon the little peaceful country of Belgium to the action of a bully who robs a small boy of his marbles. The teachings of the leaders of thought in Germany had resulted in transforming the peaceful and industrious citizen into the Prussian soldier, and the seeds sown by these teachers had borne a full harvest of militarism. The ultimate object of the Kaiser was the crushing of Britain, and for this purpose had organized a system of espionage, which he considered perfect. In this he was completely mistaken. His emissaries had informed the Canadian Government that India would not respond because of troubles regarding entrance to Canada; that Ireland was on the verge of a revolution, and accordingly the Kaiser thinking the opportune moment had arrived sought a
