Nldrs With Canadians

Ex-Sergeant J. Smith received a letter recently from England informing him that his son Walter J., who is with the 25th Canadians in France, have been again severely wounded in the fighting at Lens, in the latter part of July. He was buried from shell fire, and it was nearly two hours before he was rescued, when it was found that his ribs and breast, on the right side, was crushed, and that his heart was also affected. He arrived in England on the 31st July, and was placed in hospital at Sidmouth S. Devon, where his recovery has been very favorable. He is now at a convalescent hospital at Epsom, and expects to go to the front again as soon as he is sufficiently recovered. Walter relates that previous to being wounded this time, and while going up the line in France, he met his nephew, Max Moore, who was also on his way to join his regiment, the Princess Pats. The meeting was purely accidental and they were both surprised at meeting each other in France; more especially was Walter surprised, because when he left home three years ago with the first contingent, Max was a mere boy and was in the employ of Mr. N. Burt, at Scott's, New Gower Street, as messenger boy. He went up several times here to volunteer, but was rejected because of being under the required weight. Finding that he would not be accepted here he resigned. He then went to Mr. Burt and went to Halifax and enlisted there in the 2nd Co. of the Princess Pats, and was accepted, and shortly afterwards he went to England. Max seemed to be in good spirits when met by his uncle in France, and expressed a desire to get in the firing line. However, his wish has been gratified, and although he escaped being wounded, he is now in hospital in England suffering from trench fever. Walter J. Smith has seen some hard fighting in France since he went across the second time, having been wounded in the big drive on Verdun, last summer while with the 40th Canadians. In that battle he received a bullet in the leg and was wounded in the head likewise, and he expects to go to the front again as soon as he is pronounced fit which will be the fourth time since he joined the Canadians.

Walter is in good spirits and wishes to be remembered to all his old friends of Terra Nova. St. John's, Nov. 14th, 1917.

The work of constructing the plant is being carried on at an advanced pace, and, with a constantly increasing staff of workmen engaged, is expected to be completed about the end of the coming winter.
