"CANTON" Account Registers!

The walls are made of special heat-resisting material, and are double, with one inch air space between; this gives much better fire protection. It contains receptacles in which may be filed account slips or in which a separate book may be kept for each customer. No index is required and only one writing is necessary. These cabinets are made in different sizes. For instance: one one hundred account cabinet contains space for one hundred steady customers, also for an equal number of transient or occasional customers. This cabinet occupies a counter space of 13 1/2 by 20 inches and is 24 inches high. They are built in six sizes at following prices delivered to your store:

The Best Fumigant
FOR DESTROYING RATS ON SHIPS.
Dr. R. H. Creel, of the N. S. Public Health Service, has made a report on the relative efficiency of fumigants for rodents on ships, as determined by subsequent intensive trapping over a period of one year. Sulfur dioxide was used on 62 vessels and hydrocyanic gas on 182 vessels. With a much shorter period of exposure, the latter resulted in the destruction of 95 per cent. of the rodents, and the sulfur of only 77 per cent. Dr. Creel concludes that "sulfur fumigation is not effective for the destruction of rats on loaded vessels or in superstructures."

Cot Fund!

So generous have the people of Newfoundland been in every direction touching the War that it must seem almost unnecessary for the Committee of the St. John Ambulance Association to publish any reminder as to the needs of the Cot Fund. Indeed, the way in which the Districts outside the Capital are at the present time already remembering the requirements of the Fund is gratifying to the Committee. Nevertheless it may be desirable to array a few brief facts for general information.

It would seem from the report of the Committee which was published in the Press on the 27th of June, 1918, that the activities of the Association and its helpers have been for the last two years devoted to the establishment of what is now known as the "COT FUND."

The COT FUND was established for the purpose of discharging Newfoundland's liability for the care of our wounded soldiers. Newfoundland did not, like other Dominions, establish its own Hospital, but its Cot Fund is recognized by the Military Authorities in the United Kingdom: it endows beds in hospitals already existing.

The voluntary effort of the people of Newfoundland has distinguished itself by establishing
600 beds (2 Newfoundland Wards) at Etaples, near the French front.
233 beds in various hospitals in England.
22 beds in the Convalescent Hospital, Waterford Hall.
It will be seen from the report referred to that the upkeep of these beds now requires an expenditure of more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) annually.

The following extract from a letter from Lord Ranfurly may be of general interest:
"I am sorry to say that the St. John Ambulance Brigade Hospital, Etaples, has been severely bombed on three consecutive nights and the Government have ordered the evacuation of the small part remaining whole."
"It is a pity to say that the Newfoundland Ward 'A' is not damaged, but 'K' is seriously damaged, though we may be able to erect it partially on whatever new site we re-open."
And he has since written to describe the extra expense thrown on them by the German attack on the Hospital.

Further, the recent fighting clearly makes more and more of a demand upon hospital accommodation.

The Committee confidently hope that the work undertaken in the name of the people of Newfoundland and in a manner personally touching them will be carried on with undiminished vigor during the coming year and as long as the War lasts.

As Patron of the St. John Ambulance Association, Newfoundland Centre, I have pleasure in endorsing this appeal and stating that subscriptions may be sent to Mr. L. E. Emerson, Treasurer of the Cot Fund, St. John's, or to the nearest Stipendiary Magistrate.

Electric Light For Output

For a number of years there has been a satisfactory electric lighting system. There are dozens of so-called "cheap" market. Almost without exception they are a steady flickerless current, without batteries and then taking the lighting current in using this system they are used as batteries of fair capacity are expensive attention. When they are new, about 1000 is lost when passed through batteries; this proportion rapidly increases; this portion of the current is wasted; battery current are very expensive, therefore most battery systems use what is known as a low-voltage system, which is close to the battery. If the current is close to the battery, a short distance away, a great deal of energy is lost.

Low-voltage systems cannot use the same lamps as lamps, electric fans, etc., but require special low-voltage factory.
