Lunenburg Fishing Schooners' Race.

Nine Entrants to Sailing Competition.

Halifax, Oct. 4.—There are now nine entrants for the sailing contest between Lunenburg schooners, which is the great feature event of the Halifax Carnival, beginning on Friday. The names of the schooners entered, together with their captains, are as follows:

'Gilbert Walters,' Capt. Angus Walters.

Six of the schooners are knock-about type, and three with clipper bows. As there is much local discussion in Lunenburg as to the merits of these types of schooners, the coming race is arousing very much interest. With the exception of two of the schooners, they are all under four years of age, and are either Shelburne or Lunenburg build. As an indication of what the race really constitutes, these vessels average in size a length of one hundred and thirty-five feet over all and carry crews of fifteen each.

Compared with the contestants in the International Yacht race at New York this year, the Shamrock and the Resolute, the Lunenburg schooners in Friday's race measure on an average twenty-five and twenty-nine feet more than the Shamrock and the Resolute respectively. The race promises to be a sight exceedingly unique in nautical racing in Nova Scotia, or for that matter in Canada, and is expected to attract large crowds even from long distances.

Of these vessels, those which will not have arrived in Halifax previously, will come up from Lunenburg on Wednesday and be all in readiness for the race on Friday morning.

Fuel Scarcity in Russia.

Facing the severe northern winter without supplies of fuel, the Soviet has mobilized the entire population of the capital and forced them into the neighboring forests to cut wood. Men and women under 50 and children over 12 have been withdrawn from their usual occupations and forced to give four days of labor to the State as wood-cutters. Even at this, it is estimated that only a sixth of the fuel necessary to heat Petrograd this winter will be secured. Exposure of the city dwellers to the cold swamps where they will hew trees, is expected to result in widespread sickness, owing to the fact that most of them have insufficient clothes and no water-proof boots.

Fifty Years a Republic.

Fifty years ago this month, as the result of the disaster at Sedan, M. Jules Favre moved that Napoleon Bonaparte and his house should be declared deposed. So great was the excitement that the mob broke through into the Chamber, so that the President, Eugene Schneider, had to declare the sitting at an end. At three o'clock the Senate had to be closed, and the Republic was proclaimed at the Hotel de Ville, and in its name the deputies of Paris, with the exception of Thiers, who refused, met as a Provisional Government. The memory of the next four months, when the French sought to starve Paris into submission, still haunts thousands of French minds. The Parisians were so reduced that the animals in the Zoological Gardens were slaughtered for food, and a sewer rat was esteemed a delicacy! Need we wonder if the French demand the uttermost farthing now that the day of reckoning has come.—London Morning Post.

An Historic Rock.

A report on the Dome of the Rock of Jerusalem is shortly to be published and will be of great interest to the Mohammedan world. It may not be generally known that this place is the third in sanctity of all the sanctuaries of Islam, and indeed for a short period it actually formed the Kibla towards which all Moslems prostrated themselves in prayer. Among the more important religious associations of this rock we may mention that it was here that David and Solomon were called to repentance and on account of a vision David chose this site for his temple. From this same spot Mohammed ascended to the Seventh Heaven after his night journey from Mecca, and lastly it is to be the scene of the Great Judgment. The historical associations are not less striking, and such famous names as Omar, Abd-el-Malek, Saladin and Suleiman, are all connected with the Rock.—Zanzibar Gazette.

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For Greater Production.

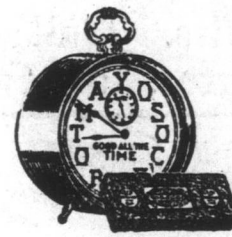
