#### WANTS RACE ENCOURAGED.

OTTAWA, May 3. William Duff, Lunenburg, urged the Government to make a grant of \$6000 to encourage the deep sea fishing vessels' race. Minister of Marine and Fisheries Lapointe promised sympathetic consideration.

#### CANADIAN REPRESENTATIVE TO WASHINGTON.

OTTAWA, May 3. The appointment of a Canadian representative at Washington is now receiving careful consideration by the Dominion Government, Premier King told the Commons to-day.

#### GETTING SENSE.

DUBLIN, May 3. On motion of De Valera Daill Eireann to-night adopted a resolution ordering the opposing side in the Irish Republican army conflict to cease firing immediately and arrange a Truce. De Valera said he would urge the independent army Executive to issue a similar order. Griffith declared the Free Staters were only defending themselves.

#### AT GENOA.

GENOA, May 3. The Economic Conference at the second plenary session to-day adopted the reports of the financial and transport Commissions.

#### BEATY OPTIMISTIC.

MONTREAL, May 3. At the annual meeting of the Canadian Pacific Railway, President Beatty spoke optimistically of the general business recovery which he saw in progress and urged the adoption of a more constructive immigration policy.

#### CIVIL WAR IN IRELAND.

KILKENNY, May 3. Sharp fighting, with machine guns rattling in all directions, was in progress here to-day. Free State troops were trying to recapture Ormond Castle, still held by Irregulars, who yesterday were driven out of other places they had captured.

#### NOT BENEFICIAL.

NEW YORK, May 3. The Herald observes that the emergency tariff because American sales to Canada have greatly decreased while Canadian products, shut out of the United States have been sold in Europe and in other markets formerly held by United States products. The Canadians, the Herald says, are now spending more of their money where they are selling more of their products.

#### PLANNING FOR PEACE.

DUBLIN, May 3. Conference representing the differing factions of the Irish Republican Army, who on Monday reached the basis of an agreement were prepared to press their plans before to-day's session of Daill Eireann. Arrangements for bringing the matter before the Daill were made at a meeting yesterday, when it was decided to issue an appeal to all ranks throughout Ireland to act in the spirit of conciliation, permitting the election of a representative Government, and putting into force the provisions of the Anglo-Irish Treaty.

#### FLOOD CONDITIONS ALARMING.

BRANDON, Man., May 3. The Assiniboine River overflowed its banks on Monday and flood conditions here and further west are becoming alarming. Heavy loss to seeded fields and live stock are likely to result.

#### RUSSIANS NOT PLEASED.

GENOA, May 3. Soviet plenipotentiaries are not delighted with the project of the powers for the reconstruction of Russia. The fact that the document on which the European statesmen have worked so laboriously does not mention recognition of the Soviet Government and ignores the suggestion of Governmental loans is said to displease the Commun-

ist leaders who are now conferring with Moscow.

#### FIGHTING IN CHINA.

PEKING, May 3. General Pei Fu, commander of Chihli forces, was reported this evening to have arrived near Machang to take personal command of the operations. Late reports are that General Tso Lin is heavily reinforcing his troops in that area. Heavy bombardments have depleted the big gun ammunition and fighting is now mainly with machine guns and rifles.

#### Tarvia Prevents Dust; Tarvia Preserves Roads.

In the United States and Canada Tarvia is the standard by which all other road-binders and preservatives are judged.

Tarvia is made in three grades—"Tarvia X" for road construction, "Tarvia B" for preservation of road surface and "Tarvia K-P" for repairing roads. Both "Tarvia B" and "Tarvia K-P" have been used in St. John's Municipal works for several years.

"Tarvia B" actually enters the road surface, acts as a cement and resists the tear and wear of traffic. By cementing together the dust particles "Tarvia B" prevents the formation of dust. After the application of "Tarvia B" to a road surface a thin layer of sand should be applied to take care of the excess liquid and to prevent tracking. This layer of sand will prevent horses from slipping and automobiles from skidding and will prolong the life of the road surface. Broken stone is not as satisfactory or as economical as sand for this purpose.

A road after being treated with "Tarvia B" does not become muddy in rainy weather, the water and dries off quickly after the rain, leaving the road in admirable condition while untreated roads are still deep with mud.

"Tarvia B" surfacing should be applied annually but only when roads are in good condition and free from surplus dust. All holes and depressions should be repaired with fine broken stone and "Tarvia K-P."

When "Tarvia B" is applied by mechanical sprinker, care should be taken to have men with brooms and hand sprinklers go over the ground so that excess "Tarvia B" may be brushed out and not allowed to run waste and so that bare spots be treated and the entire road surface secured.

A loose, "happy-go-lucky" application is sheer waste of time and money, "whatever is worth doing, is worth doing well."

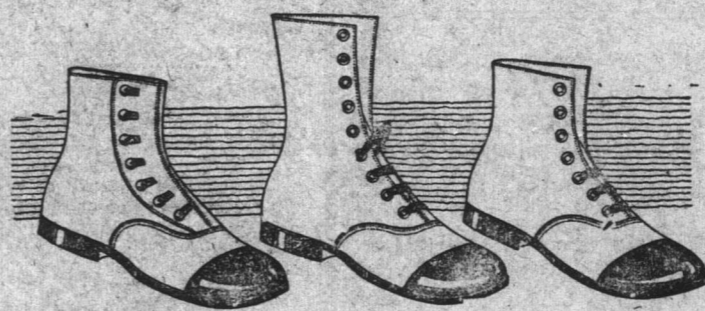

## Violent Fighting in Ireland Continues.

### Free State Troops Capture Castle.

France and Belgium Oppose Russian Memorandum --- English Lockout Involves 750,000 Workers.

#### WILL SUPPORT BELGIUM.

PARIS, May 3. The French Government has decided to stand by Belgium in her opposition to the terms of the Allied memorandum to Russia on the private question it was officially announced to-day.

#### THE BATTLE OF KILKENNY.

KILKENNY, May 3. The battle of Kilkenny ended at 9 o'clock to-night when the Free State captured Ormond Castle, the stronghold of Irregulars. After ordering the Irregulars with arms ammunition were marched to the State military barracks. Eight were reported killed in the fighting.

#### THE ENGINEERS' LOCKOUT.

LONDON, May 3. The quarters of a million of the workers in England's engineering industry are now locked out; some 100,000 are being affected by the lockout caused by a dispute on the question of the rights

of management in the workshops. The employers opened their shops for the employment of men wishing to resume work on the employers' terms, but reports to-day showed very few availed themselves of the opportunity. Meanwhile an official inquiry into the trouble was opened to-day by William MacKenzie, President of the Industrial Court.

#### RESUMES SERVICE.

MONTREAL, May 3. With the arrival of the liner Albany, to-day the Cunard Company resumed regular trans-Atlantic service after the lapse of seven years. All the Cunard liners running to Montreal before were lost during the war.

#### ALL TO BLAME.

DUBLIN, May 3. In presenting to Daill Eireann a plan for the unification of the factions of the Irish Republican Army Commandant Sean Osegary, spokesman for the six officers of the insurgent section, said Daill was losing respect on account of its dealing in person-alities and its lack of sense of respon-
