"John Stuart Mill." An excellent article.—ART. VI. "Third Class Passenger Traffic." Advocates cheap transportation, and advances the attachment of third class passenger cars to all trains.—ART. VII. "Medical Charity." Its Extent and Abuses." A statistical article, giving lists of the London Hospitals, Dispensaries, and Asylums, their expenditure, income, number of patients, and every thing connected with the subject.—The remainder of the *Review* is devoted, as usual, to brief notices of Contemporary Literature, which will suggest to each reader the new books that will be most attractive to his mind.
