

TIMES ARE OUT OF JOINT SAYS MINISTER

Retiring Moderator of the Presbyterian Assembly in U. S. Makes Strong Complaint

Atlantic City, N. J., May 19.—"I cannot be a pessimist while God is in Heaven, but I declare to you that despite the muck rakers and the mock reformers as we will, that times are out of joint," said the Rev. Dr. James M. Barkley of Detroit, today in his sermon opening the 122nd general assembly of the Presbyterian church on the steel pier this morning.

"If virtues are virtue," continued the retiring moderator, "evils are gigantic. Evils that threaten the very existence of this Christian nation are in the vulgar race for gain and the rottenness of social life. The inordinate love of money is the parental and passionate root of sins that have vitiated the whole world. It has given us the grafter in office and the 'white slave dealer' in society, these twin vampires of civilization. It has corrupted the functions of government and has choked the channels of justice."

"Sunday baseball, Sunday excursions, Sunday newspapers, Sunday sermons, Sunday theatres and the like are his creatures. Not one of them is prompted by motives of benevolence. 'Not one of them leaves the world better but worse. It is money just that promotes the prize ring with its survival of savagery that once butchered

ATTRACTING SETTLERS TO COLONY OF VICTORIA

Australians Trying to Interest English in Victorian Irrigation

Melbourne, May 19.—Mr. MacKenzie, Victorian minister of lands, and Mr. Filwood Mead, chairman of the water commission, called yesterday for Great Britain in connection with the government's immigration scheme. They will probably spend the month of July in Great Britain. The main object of their mission is to promote emigration from Great Britain to the irrigated lands in Victoria. It is hoped that forty thousand suitable immigrants will be brought to the colony within the next two years.

REGINA DIVIDED ABOUT THE MEMORIAL CEREMONIES

Some Stores Open All Day and Some Stop Open Half the Day

Regina, Sask., May 19.—Merchants here are at loggerheads over the closing of stores tomorrow out of respect to the memory of the King. The mayor's position is that it is necessary to close for the morning only, and as he is at the head of one of the largest stores of the city, it will be kept open during the afternoon. The two other large departmental stores will also keep open, but many of the smaller stores will close for the day. There is quite a warm feeling worked up over the situation, and it looks as though tomorrow about half the people of Regina would mourn in the morning and the other half all day. Altogether the situation is making something of a monkey of the city officials.

TORIES OF MEDICINE HAT WILL NOMINATE CANDIDATE

A Convention Has Been Summoned For June 2

CANADA'S CONVICT POPULATION

There are six penitentiaries in the Dominion, and the population of these institutions in the fiscal year 1908-09 was 1,765. Their nationality, as indicated by country of birth, is as follows:

The Canadian born constitute 59 per cent.; the British born outside of Canada, 18 per cent.; and foreigners, 23 per cent. Ten per cent. are under 20 years of age; 77.4 are between 20 and 30 years; and 12.7 are between 30 and 40 years of age. Fifteen per cent. are unable to read or write. Seventeen per cent. have been total abstainers, and 40 per cent. have been intemperate. In civil condition, 1,196 are single, 512 married, and 57 widowed. The average daily population was 1,625. The criminal record shows that 1,435 offenders are serving first terms, 234 second terms, 65 a third term; and there is one case each of tenth, twelfth and fifteenth terms. In duration of sentence, 66 are serving periods of two, three, five or seven years respectively. The classification by occupations shows that 603 registered as laborers and 129 as farmers—these being the two largest single classes.
