

Pt. Bruce Booming

Aylmer, May 19, 1924
Port Bruce, Aylmer's lakeside resort, nine miles south of the town, and one of the prettiest spots along the north shore of Lake Erie, is experiencing another real boom this spring. During the past few years the Port has changed so much that it is hardly recognized by those who have not visited it recently. The big summer hotel built by Mr. W. Heard, of St. Thomas, owner of the Aylmer Pump & Scale Co., Aylmer, is now completed and will be ready to receive guests this summer.

In fact we understand there are many applications in now for rooms in this new hotel for the summer. The Boy Scouts of London and vicinity have already decided to camp at Port Bruce. The Y. W. C. A. of London, who have a big permanent camp at Bruce, report that they expect a larger camp than ever this summer. This camp will be officially opened by a big ceremony on Saturday, May 24th.

Several new homes and cottages are now being erected and will be ready for occupancy in a few weeks. Mr. Campbell, a former resident of Port Bruce, but for many years a successful contractor in Detroit, has retired and is building an up-to-date residence, with all modern conveniences.
