Selecting Orchard Trees.

A writer in the London Garden makes the just remark that while many make the mistake of planting too many kinds few set too few, and add, no one should plant any additional or untried sort however much it may be praised, before proving its adaptability to the soil in which it is to grow. Among the many queries which we receive for advice in making selections, nearly all are relative to some new or untried variety with a laudatory name, and which may, probably be of some value when proved in future years. The advice which we are always disposed to give to such inquirers is: "Keep clear of new and lauded fruits until you have tried a single specimen of each sort, and order your main planting of old, well proved standard varieties. Nearly all the new and highly praised fruits will be forgotten before many years have passed away." We have just been conversing with an intelligent planter, who purchased a few years ago 300 trees of a highly lauded pear the trees here this year, and he could not engage a man to gather up the crop on shares, and the fruit was so poor in quality that although some were seen with marks of the teeth, none were eaten.
