Flames Break Out in the Back of the Organ Loft.

\$410,000 Reduced to a Ruin. A Large Hotel Wrecked and Many Other Buildings Damaged by the Fire-Con-

NEW YORK, May 13. - Rev. Dr. Talmage's new tabernacle, at the corner of Clinton and Greene avenues, Brooklyn, was burned to-day.
