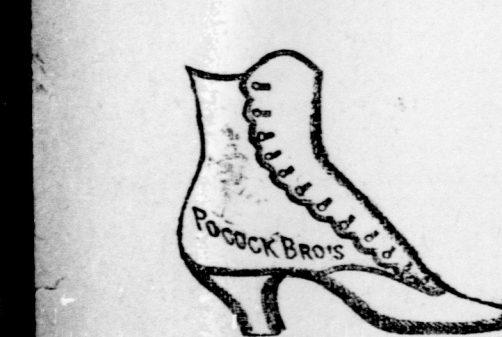

A Money Relic.

Mr. John Connor, of the old book store,
Richmond street, has got hold of another
curiosity, of which he is proud. It is an
eccentric two-dollar bill, issued in the
colony of New York, just prior to the
declaration of independence. On one side
of the bill is the following inscription:

"Two dollars—New York—Two dollars—
New York currency. Two dollars—Go
to Boston by the Fall River line from New
York," and in a rounded device the follow-
ing legend: "Salutaris Sibi Parentibus-
que." On the reverse side of the script
is the following statement: "Colony of
New York—This bill shall pass current in
all payments in this Colony, for the value
thereof in Gold or Silver currency; accord-
ing to the resolution of the Provincial
Congress of New York, on the second day
of September, 1775. John Brown, E.
Miller, jun."
