—The Allan Liner Mongolian made her last trip in 7 days and 7 hours.

—Mr. Crawford Beckett, contractor, is lying very seriously ill at his home on Maitland street.

—Wm. Graman, of Cranbrook, has been sent to London Hospital to undergo medical treatment.

—The Dr. Cream referred to in a cable dispatch was the man who is supposed to have killed a woman in this city.

—Mr. Geo. W. V. Might and wife are in the city. Mr. Might is looking after the revising of the new city directory.

—The schooner Pandora (Capt. Glass) arrived at Port Stanley on Sunday from Cleveland with 500 tons of coal for London.

—Mr. Nifty Brown, of this city, has been engaged to sing two solos at the Grangers' picnic, to be held at Zorra in August.

—The street railway company has arranged to purchase power for the Springbank line from the Canadian General Electric Company.

—James McPherson, of London West, who is alleged to have stolen a gold ring from a tramp named Jas. Clark, has been sent for trial by Squire Lacey.

The salary will be about \$400.

The lecturer is a missionary to Araconia, and eminently fitted to speak on the subject chosen.
