**NUMIDIAN ARRIVES**  
Overdue Steamer With the Strathconas on Board, Signaled at Halifax.

Halifax, N. S., March 8.—The steamer Numidian, with the Strathconas on board, was signalled off the harbor early this morning. The Numidian was expected to reach Halifax on Sunday or Monday last.

**TWO BIG FIRES.**  
New York, March 7.—The residence of Frank Dexter, at 33rd street and 11th avenue, Brooklyn, was entirely destroyed by fire early today, causing a loss of \$40,000, covered by insurance. Several of the inmates had narrow escapes, but no one was injured.

**Elyria, Ohio, March 7.—Fire today** destroyed the building occupied by the Fay Stocking Factory and the Elyria Canning Company. Loss \$30,000, partially insured.

An aged and respected citizen, Mr. Wm. Thomson, died Thursday at Hamilton. He was 82 years of age, and five sons and two daughters survive him.

# A BATTLE AT LICHTENBURG

## Boers Failed in a Determined Attack Upon the Town.

### Sixteen British Killed and Twenty Wounded—More Troops for South Africa—Boer Forces Broken—Intervention Their Only Hope—Dewet and Steyn Still on the Run.

London, March 8. — Lord Kitchener, under date of March 7, says:

"The Boers failed in their determined attack upon Lichtenburg. Our losses, besides the two officers previously reported, were 14 men killed and 20 wounded. The Boer general, Celliers, was killed.

"Dewet's position is variously reported, as his men are scattering through the Orange River Colony. Our troops, marching north, reached Petrusburg today.

"French reports further capture of a 14-pounder Cruizer, with carriage and limber complete, and one Hotchkiss, making a total of seven guns. The total number of Boers known to have been placed hors de combat since the eastern operations began is 974."

Lord Kitchener states that 169 rifles, 24,750 rounds of ammunition, 154 horses, 1,240 trek oxen, 3,920 cattle, 15,580 sheep, 100 wagons, and carts, and large quantities of forage have been captured, without casualties, in Cape Colony.

He further reports: "Parsons found a small commando north of Aberdeen and attacked them. Kritzinger's commando yesterday entered Pearston, but Goringe from the west turned them out and Delile headed them off on the road to Somerset East."

**STILL SENDING TROOPS.**  
London, Friday, March 8. — Whatever negotiations are proceeding in Pretoria, and Mr. Kruger declares that they can only be for an armistice, the government evidently has no idea of slackening reinforcements. The war office issued a detailed statement last evening of transports that are to sail for South Africa within the coming week with 12,000 troops.

**LICHTENBURG FIGHT.**  
The casualty list reveals the fact that two officers were killed at Lichtenburg, March 3. Lord Kitchener's telegram, "Am sending reinforcements," was dated March 6. Evidently, therefore, the fighting continued for some days, and further advice are awaited with anxiety.

**STEYN AND DEWET.**  
According to the Daily Mail's dispatches, General Dewet and Mr. Steyn have separated, the former being at Petrusburg, west of Bloemfontein, and the latter at Smithfield.

**BUBONIC AT CAPE TOWN.**  
The progress of the bubonic plague caused deep anxiety and apprehension in Cape Town. The Cape Government has decided to remove the people from one-third of the city area, and to cleanse it. Every precaution will be taken should the disease spread to the troops.

**REITZ CRAZY.**  
The Amsterdam correspondent of the Daily Mail says Mr. Kruger is informed that Mr. F. W. Reitz, former secretary of the Transvaal, is suffering from aberration of the mind.

**BRITISH SURRENDER.**  
Cape Town, March 7. The prime minister reports that since crossing the Orange River Gen. Dewet has moved north of Philippolis. Malan's Scouts moved through Richmond, and came in contact with a patrol of 74 of Kitchener's Scouts at Kipskraal on February 26. After a short engagement, in which three of the patrol were killed and many wounded, the British were forced to surrender to the 200 Boers surrounding them. The Cape Government reported at Modderfontein, south of Blesboepoort, where he fired upon a train yesterday. The Australians on the train kept the Boers off. The burghers are being followed by a detachment of Kitchener's Scouts.

**FIGHTING ALL DAY.**  
London, March 7.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Lord Kitchener: "Pretoria, March 6.—Lichtenburg being attacked by Delarey's forces; fighting continued all day long. The garrison consists of 200 Yeomanry and 300 Northumberland Fusiliers, with two guns. Major Fletcher and Lieut. Hull are reported killed. I am sending reinforcements."

**BRITISH REOCCUPY PEARSTON.**  
Cape Town, March 7.—It is officially announced that Col. Goringe reoccupied Pearston, on the Great River, March 5. He says the town should have been impregnable to the Boers, but the town guard offered inadequate resistance, and the Boers captured the place, together with 60 rifles, 15 men and 20,000 rounds of ammunition.

**BOER FORCES BROKEN.**  
Cape Town, March 7.—Col. Goringe has inflicted severe loss upon Commandant Kritzinger, breaking his force into three parts. The operations are apparently resulting in Kritzinger being driven eastward across the rain forest. His exact whereabouts is not reported, but 500 Boers who occupied Pearston, probably belonging to Kritzinger's commando, are moving in the direction of Somerset East. The British are pursuing them.

three promissory notes given by Bossard to Stumpf, the tailor, but which the latter met himself. The matter came up in a lengthy and telling speech by Mr. Graham on the budget in the presence of crowded and intensely interested galleries. Several other members spoke on the budget yesterday, and a conclusion will not be reached until Tuesday.

**THE BUDGET DEBATE.**  
Mr. McLaughlin, Stormont, was the first speaker for the opposition. He contended that the government had taken from the people in direct taxation \$17,252,880 since 1873. Was it any wonder that the people would "remember Ross" when he came before them for re-election. The opposition was in favor of developing New Ontario, but not on the plan of giving it away to private individuals and corporations. He would support the government in building a railway to Temiscaming and in giving a million dollars toward road improvement, provided it was not a scheme to put money into the hands of government officials.

**A UNIQUE POSITION.**  
Mr. Auld (South Essex) was of opinion that Ontario occupied a unique position among the States and provinces of this continent, inasmuch as it had no direct taxation, and had a surplus. (Ministerial applause.) It had been argued that the province had taken \$5,000,000 from the municipalities in the way of liquor licenses, but those who made such statements were not far enough to state that about \$3,000,000 had been handed back in one form or another to those municipalities. Mr. McLaughlin had complained that the Western Dairy School did not pay. It mattered little whether it paid or not, so long as it was doing good work by training and turning out men who would be a credit to the country.

Mr. Jessop, Lincoln, said the government's policy on the matter of the San Jose scale was in itself sufficient to condemn the agricultural department. The old feudal system, he said, was no worse than that adopted by the Ontario Government, which had an army of officials and retainers, bound tight for it at the next election, by legitimate or illegitimate means.

**MERELY A TRANSFER OF RESOURCES.**  
Mr. Graham, Brockville, defended the selling of timber, and said it was simply the removal of one part of our resources to give place to another. It was more profitable. The growth of expenditure was just as reasonable in the case of the province as in the case of an individual from his youth to maturity. It made no difference what the expenditure was so long as we got benefit for the money spent. The timber and minerals of New Ontario might stand as they are until doomsday, and be useless, did the government not wisely place it in a position to be accessible to the hand of labor. That was the government's policy of development. Mr. Graham interpreted the praise of Col. Matheson's great financial ability by Mr. Whitney as a slap at Mr. Marter, the former opposition leader, whose differences with his present chief the speaker regretted to see. Mr. Graham endeavored to divine the opposition's policy, and said it was made up of shreds and patches contributed by many members. As nearly as he could make out the financial policy of the opposition was to take in less money and pay out more, and have more left. (Laughter and cheers.)

**NORTH WATERLOO ELECTION.**  
Continuing, he referred to the charges of the opposition regarding North Waterloo and West Elgin. He thought that perhaps both sides were not blameless in regard to the practices of their friends in elections. But he desired to express the opinion that the opposition should be very careful in throwing stones, and in this regard he intended to show that the evidence of one Bossard, of Berlin, given in the North Waterloo election case, prompted by the organizers of the Conservative party, and paid for by them. (Applause.) Mr. Graham then read the affidavits made by Bossard, subsequent to the trial, as referred to above.

Mr. McDiarmid, West Elgin, followed. He characterized the West Elgin commission as a solemn farce and a judicial mockery.

Mr. Hylop, East Huron, spoke briefly, and an adjournment was moved by Mr. Beatty, of Leeds, at 11 o'clock.

## HOW EVIDENCE WAS BOUGHT!

Startling Affidavit Laid Before the Legislature

In Connection With the North Waterloo Election—The Work of Conservatives.

Toronto, March 8.—In the legislature last evening, Mr. Graham, the member for Brockville, created a sensation by reading an affidavit made by Albert Bossard, of Berlin, in which he declared that his evidence given at the North Waterloo election trial had been purchased by Conservative agents in the riding. Bossard was the most important witness at the trial at which Mr. Breithaupt, the Liberal member, was unseated. According to this affidavit, Bossard was cajoled into making an affidavit before the election trial, implying several prominent Liberals in deeds of corruption. He was then approached, under a threat that if he did not give evidence to that effect at the trial he would be prosecuted for perjury. He was also promised one hundred dollars in lieu thereof, but as a matter of fact was paid fifty dollars in the form of clothes from a Berlin tailor, one of the main negotiators. Mr. Graham supported the affidavit with
