

The order also directs that all public amusements, including and theatrical performances be suspended until after the funeral. SIMPLE SERVICES.

In accordance with the expressed wishes of the deceased, the funeral services will be simple as possible under the circumstances. The bedy will remain on the bed where she died until ready for the coffin. The roses in which it is almost buried are from her private garden, many of the blooms being from bushes cultivated with her own hands. No one will be allowed to view it except the members of the immediate family and household.

On Thursday the royal family will Sunday afternoon a funeral service will be held in the presence of the family of the Empress, her household, a few of her friends and other priviledged persons. It is expected here that King Edward will be present. The royal family will go to Potsdam Sunday evening, and the body will be taken there Monday evening. The funeral service in the mausoleum at Friedenskirche, Potsdam, will be held Tuesday. As is was be no state ceremony, the service will not be attended by all the German royal personages. It will be as simple as possible. Emperor William has received a telegram of sympathy from the Pope.


