London, Monday, April 6.

A Tribute to Mr. Hyman.

Mr. C. S. Hyman, M. P., is winning many encomiums by his work as chairman of the railway committee of the House of Commons. It is a trying position and demands exceptional qualities. To begin with it presupposes a thorough familiarity with the railway act, no easy task for a new member. Mr. Hyman mastered the act and showed the skill of an old parliamentary hand during his first term in the chairmanship. The member for London has a driving energy, a firmness and decision, and the faculty of a trained business man, combined with tact and urbanity, which are great aids in facilitating the work of the committee. A strong hand is especially needed at this time when Parliament is besieged by franchise hunters, and the railway committee is the cockpit of the House. The Ottawa correspondent of the Montreal Herald graphically describes the arena in which the member for London is the chief figure:

"There have been some fierce battles in the House of Commons, and even the dignified and decorous Upper House has been the scene of strife. But the best fight of the ground is where the Railway Committee foregathers. It is there that the Titans meet in the closest embrace. It is there the heaviest blows are dealt, and the most cunningly planned punitive expeditions go into the enemy's territory with fire and sword."

"A row in the House is to one in the committee as a ring combat is to a street riot. In the House the sides are defined and a man knows his opponents. In the committee party lines disappear. There are no Liberal and no Conservative at Ottawa until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and the committees meet in the morning. There are rules for the regulation of business in the committee, but there are no traditions such as hold in the House. The rules are chiefly honored in the breach, and when the struggle is hot the only rule which holds is to hit where they are weak. When privileges to build lines are sought, and half a dozen interests are seeking permission to exploit one particularly choice piece of territory, friendship ceases, and the best man or the best company wins."

"The Railway Committee is the stamping ground of the franchise grabber. The saving feature for the public is the fact that the ministers are always present, and behind them are a large number of upright members, both Liberal and Conservative, who hold the commendable opinion that the public must be protected. If it were not for this band of stalwarts the Dominion of Canada would now be utterly in the hands of promoters and the people would be merely tolerated by them. There is a promoter to ask for, and for nothing too big or too valuable for a rather mild term. They demand it and insist upon the delivery of the goods."

"The Railway Committee needs a chairman who can handle a situation without gloves. It is no place for a man who hesitates to assert himself. A weakling in the chair would be like a lamb among wolves. For the last two sessions the chairmanship has been given to Mr. Charles Hyman, the member for London. There is probably no other man in the House who could do the work as well. There is a directness in his manner which brings the most turbulent group to order when the command goes forth. He has the happy faculty of falling on rioters like a ton weight from the top of a tall building with the most friendly manner and the most amiable smile. No man has ever been known to take offense at his rulings, and no one has ever hesitated about obeying him. He is friendly, reasonable and just, but he manages to convey the impression somehow that he is not to be trifled with."

This disinterested testimony to the ability of Mr. Hyman will be read with pleasure by the people of London, Liberals and Conservatives alike. They have a common pride in seeing the member for London, as a local product, distinguish himself. The Montreal Herald is of the opinion that still higher honors are in store for Mr. Hyman. It says, editorially:

"Our Ottawa correspondent writes that Mr. Charles Hyman, M. P., makes a first-class chairman of that hardest of all committees to handle, the Railway Committee. His friends all believe he will show himself able for even harder tasks than that before long."

Life Insurance in Canada.

The tremendous growth of life insurance in Canada is illustrated in a recent blue-book which carries the figures down to Dec. 31, 1902. Last year all the companies doing business in Canada effected insurance to the amount of \$81,501,810. Their premium income from Canada for the year was \$17,118,565. The volume of insurance in this country on Dec. 31 had reached \$608,794,371, representing 544,426 policies. In 1875 only \$85,009,284 was in force. The expansion during the past years has been very rapid and has been divided among Canadian, British and American companies as follows:

The eggs consumed, if placed end to end, would form a chain 6 1/2 miles long. The year's milk bill was over \$25,000. The hospital goes so far as to estimate that if last year's patients could be stood side by side they would make a line 66 1/2 miles long.

METAL WORKERS COMING

Discharged Arsenal Workers Booked for This Country.

London, April 6.—The emigration movement is spreading to the arsenal workers. Six hundred and thirty-five men were discharged from the Royal Arsenal through slackness of work, and many are booking for Canada, a local clergyman having guaranteed of permanent work in Canada for any number of competent tool makers, machinists, fitters, brass finishers, pattern makers, iron molders and boiler makers.

London, April 6.—The question of the delay in the delivery of the American mails was brought up by Sir John Leng (Liberal) in the House of Commons to-day. He complained that, under the shipping combination's regime, Wednesday's mails for New York were carried on slow boats, making it impossible for New York correspondents to send their replies by boats leaving on the Saturday of the week following. Sir John wanted the conditions of the White Star Line's contract fulfilled before the line was transferred to the combine.

Postmaster-General Austen Chamberlain explained that the Cedric, Celtic and Cyrric were only employed in carrying mails when the fastest White Star Line steamers were withdrawn, but they would resume running regularly after April 15.

COUNSEL PREPARE FOR THE INQUIRY

Subpoenas Issued for Over One Hundred Witnesses.

FUNDS FOR THEIR PAYMENT

An Order Has Been Made for the Production of All Necessary Documents.

Toronto, April 6.—The counsel who will act for both sides in the investigation of the Gamey charges are busy preparing for the opening of the case on the 13th. It is stated that subpoenas have been issued to nearly 150 persons to appear as witnesses, most of them from Manitoulin. On Saturday Mr. W. D. McPherson received from Col. Clarke, the clerk of the Legislative Assembly, \$500 for payment of conduct money to witnesses.
