

conditions under which the governors would be elected:
"Life Contributors—Every person or society contributing \$100 to the hospital

society contributing \$100 to the hospital shall be a life contributor. Any person or society furnishing a room shall be considered a life contributor, so long as such contributor keeps the room properly furnished, unless satisfactory proof be 'given that the original cost of furnishing exceeded \$100, in which case it shall not be necessary to refurnish the room at any time.

"The life contributors shall elect one "The life contributors shall elect one of their number to be a governor for three years; and each contributor shall

have one vote for every \$100 he may have contributed. "When the number of possible votes of life contributors shall exceed 100, they shall elect two governors; and an

additional governor for every addition al 100 votes. "Annual Contributors-Every person contributing \$10 shall be an annual con-tributor for the twelve months immediately following the payment of the

"Annual contributors may elect one of their number to be a governor for one year, and every annual contributor shall have one vote at such election for every \$10 he may have contributed; provided that no election shall be held at any time unless there are a possible 100 votes to be cast. And for every possible 100 votes of annual contributors there shall be one governor elect-
