VISITING THE VILLAGES

Anthracite Commission in the I ehigh Valley.

Spent Day Among the Miners' Homes and in a Colliery.

Hazelton, Pa., Nov. 3.-Midnight.-The anthracite coal strike commission spent the entire day in the Lehigh Valley region, visiting one mine and several of the mining villages. The trip of the commission through this region was an interesting one, the conditions of mining ing somewhat different from those existing in the Lackawanna and Wyoming Valley.

WHERE A STRIKE IS ON. At Drifton, a crowd gathered about the commission as Superintendent Smith, of Coxe Bros.' Company, whose mines are located there, explained the trouble between the company and its men. All the miners employed at these mines are still on strike, because the company insists upon the men re-turning to work as individuals and not in a body. At Jeddo, John Mar-kle, the independent operator, joined the party and escorted the commissioners to the mining village of Oak-dale, near Jeddo. Mr. Markle showed them the club house which he maintains there for the benefit of the men. On the run to Hazelton, where the breaker of No. 40 shaft was inspected, Messrs. Markle, Duffy and Gallahad a spirited discussion over the differences existing at the Markle mines. None of the men at the Marcolliery have returned to work, for the same reasons as those which are keeping the men out of the Coxe mines. Mr. Markle told them he was running the Markle Company and would maintain discipline.

EFFECT OF A BLAST The commissioners were lowered into the workings, 350 feet below, through an 1,100 feet slope. One of the new "physical features" they saw was a vein of coal with a very steep pitch, which was difficult to mine. While they were inspecting this a blast was fired in a near-by chamber, and the lights carried by those who remained in the gangways below were extin-guished by the rush of air. Some of the party were timid for a moment, wondering what had happened, but they were quickly assured that there was no danger.

Assaulter Gets Full Benefit of the Law Meted Out to Him.

Windsor, Nov. 4.-David Valandry, 21 years old, a deserter from the Unit-States army, was convicted before Judge Horne in Sandwich, Opt., yesterday, of criminal assault on the 8-yearold daughter of Alec Eagle, of Essex Town, Essex County, and was sentenced to ten years in Kingston Penitentiary.

In addition, Valandry is to get two whippings at the post, the first after he has served two months, and the second at the end of the first year of his prison term. A dozen lashes are to be laid on his bare back each time. Judge Horne gave him the full pen-

Valandry was convicted a few days ago of assaulting a young girl named Mary Wesson. This was just before his more serious offense, and he was sentenced to a year in the Central Prison at Toronto.
