## TODAY'S MARKETS

## THE LOCAL MARKET.

London, Tuesday, Nov. 4.  
There was a very small attendance of  
farmers at the market here today. The  
majority of them have not yet completed  
their fall plowing, and the gathering of  
their root crops.

Grain—About a dozen loads of oats  
were offered; prices were firm, at 90c to  
91c per cwt. Three loads of wheat sold  
at \$1.12 per cwt.  
Hay and Straw—Sixteen loads of hay  
were offered; sales were easily made for  
the best, at \$10.00 per ton; inferior and  
medium quality were a slow sale at \$8  
to \$9 per ton. Straw sells at \$3 per load,  
or by the ton at \$5.50.

Butter and Eggs—There was very little  
offered in these lines; prices were  
unchanged from those quoted.

Potatoes—About half a dozen loads on  
sale, which were disposed of at 90c to  
91c per bag. No change in the prices of  
other vegetables.

Fruit—Apples were about the only offer-  
ings in this line; sales were, as usual,  
slow, at prices quoted.

Poultry—Very little on sale; prices were  
unchanged.

Dressed Hogs—There were about 25 of-  
fered, most of them were sold at \$7.25 to  
\$7.50 per cwt; three choice loads sold at  
\$7.50 to \$7.75 per cwt.

Butcher's Meats—The supply was light,  
but sufficient for all requirements; prices  
were unchanged.

PRODUCE MARKETS.

TORONTO.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Wheat—The deliveries  
are not heavy, there is a good demand  
for home milling, and the market is fully  
higher for No. 2 red and white than a  
week ago; prices now being 90c east and  
89c west; No. 1 hard is firmer, at 91c  
east and 90c west; No. 1 hard is quoted at  
the past week; No. 1 hard is quoted at  
91c, and No. 1 northern at 89c, grinding  
in transit. Flour—in better demand;  
cars of Ontario patents are quoted at  
\$2.70 in buyers' bags east and west, and  
choice brands are held 1c to 2c higher.  
Millfeed—in fair demand and steady, at  
16c for cars of shorts and 12c for bran  
in bulk, east and west. Barley—Choice  
bright malting grades are in demand for  
home brewers, as well as for export to  
the United States; a few lots have been  
shipped to the United States; there is  
very little grain that will grade much  
better than No. 3 extra, or No. 2; prices  
are fair; No. 3 extra is quoted at 45c.  
No. 3 at 40c, and feed at 30c, east of  
middle freights west. Buckwheat—Steady,  
8c to 8 1/2c, east or middle freights. Rye—

Steady, at 40c for No. 2 east and 40c  
for middle freights. Corn—Easter, at 80c  
for Canada yellow west; American No. 3  
yellow is quoted at 70c for car lots on  
the track at Toronto. Oats—Steady; No. 1  
white are quoted at 22c, middle freights.  
Peas—Steady, at 7c for choice milling  
east, and 7c for choice milling west.  
The offerings of rolls are fair, and the  
receipts of medium grades are rather  
heavy; there is a good demand for choice  
and creamery; prices are steady; cream-  
ery prints, 2 1/2 to 2 1/2c; solids, fresh-made,  
10c to 12c; earlier milk, 10c to 12c; dairy  
tubs and pails, choice, 15c to 16c; medium,  
14c to 15c; common, 12c to 14c; pound  
rolls, 10c to 12c; medium, 10c to 12c.  
The receipts of strictly fresh-gathered  
are not very large; there is a good de-  
mand, and prices are firm, at 15c to 16c;  
splints and seconds are quoted at 13c to  
14c, and limed at 15c to 16c. Dressed hogs  
25c market is easier, that it was a  
week ago; the receipts continued light;  
farmers lots here sold at \$7.50 to \$8.

TORONTO.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Baled Hay—Offerings  
are large and the market is easy;  
cars of No. 1, mostly on the track  
at Toronto, are quoted at \$5 to \$5.50  
per ton.

Baled Straw—Quiet, at \$5 to \$5.25 per ton  
for cars on the track here.
