BRITAIN TALKS STRAIGHT TO SULTAN; "NO COMPROMISE," TIME RUNNING SHORT

Turkish Foreign Minister Has "Proposals," But Is Told That There Must Be Nothing Less Than Absolute Compliance With British Demands.

Constantinople. May 11.-Tewfik Pasha, the foreign minister, called at the British embassy yesterday and made proposals in regard to the Tabah question which Ambassador O'Connor unhesitatingly rejected. The pasha was informed that any compromise suggestions were quite inadmissible and that nothing less than absolute compliance with the British demands would prevent drastic action. The ambassador also warned the minister that time was running short and counseled him to be under no UPROAR IN ROME: misapprehension in regard to the determination of Great Britain to enforce the Turkish evacuation of Egyptian territory on the Sinai Peninsula and a joint delimitation of the frontier.


