### **CLOSE CALL FROM** TERRIBLE DEATH

James Sullivan, of Forward Avenue, Found Lying Beside the G. T. R. Tracks.

ACCIDENT IS MYSTERY

Dr. Drake, Who Is Attending the Patient, Says He Will Recover. Is Badly Injured.

James Sullivan, of Forward avenue was found lying besides the Grand Trunk tracks near the Thames street arch bridge, shortly after 6 o'clock this morning. He was in an unconscious condition when found. Night Station Agent John Gillean was notified, and at once called the ambulance and had Sullivan removed to Victoria Hospital, where he was attended by Dr. Drake. Upon examination it was found that he was suffering from a bad scalp wound. Dr. Drake, however, expects him to recover.

Sullivan regained consciousness this morning, but was unable to give any account of how the accident occurred. It is believed that he was struck by an outgoing freight, and had a very close call from being hurled over the side of the bridge, in which case he would have fallen about 25 feet to the street below.
