

LONDON MAY NOT PROTEST PETROLEA'S WIN

PETROLEA WINS DISTRICT HONORS

Take Deciding Game From London at Strathroy By Score 7 to 0.

FIELD NOT SUITABLE

And Puzzled Locals—All Tallying Done in Last Five Minutes of Play.

It now appears that London will not protest the win of Petrolea at Strathroy Saturday, when the locals lost in the play-off for the western district championship of the O. R. F. U. by 7 to 0, although the officials of the team notified Referee Livingstone, of Toronto, that they would object to Dawson, who they claim played on Queen's intermediate.

The teams were too evenly matched to make the game more than ordinarily interesting, and a peculiar feature of the contest was that no scoring was done until the last five minutes, when two touchdowns and a try, not converted, put the Oil Towners into the championship.

Game Was Rough. The game was rough in spots, and the action of a Petrolea man in deliberately kicking Sage in the abdomen could scarcely be more unportsmanlike. Had the offender been mobbed few spectators would have cared what the outcome would be.

London had a small following, while the green and white was in evidence everywhere. A large number of boys were brought down by the Petrolea backers for the purpose of making all possible noise.

The losers played a slower game than that of a week ago at Tecumseh Park, while the "Oily Lemons," as they chose to call themselves, were much better form. The following up of "Tiny" Sage was one of the features of the play, while Jack McCall was in it every minute.

Field Was Not Suitable. It cannot be denied that the O. R. F. U. displayed good judgment in ordering the play-off to take place in Strathroy, as the grounds were far from satisfactory. There were no dead lines, and the crowd seemed in on the field for yards. There was no police protection, and as the play changed from one side of the gridiron to the other dozens of spectators would chase across the field and interfere with the combatants.

The officials, Referee Livingstone and Umpire DeGruchy, of Toronto, handled the contest to the entire satisfaction of both teams.

Play was confined to the centre of the field in the first part of the opening period, but at the finish London worked up to the goal line, where Hurley was given the ball to kick. He sent it into his own scrimmage, however, and the whistle blew as the men lined up on the fifteen-yard line.

There was nothing doing till the final quarter in the scoring line, Petrolea was urged on by the rosters, who swarmed onto the field, and made it impossible for the locals to hear their own signals. A futile effort was made by the officials to put them back to the touch line, and play continued.

Petrolea secured the ball on an off-side, 25 yards from London's goal, and Dawson tried a drop kick. The pigskin struck the bar and fell back into the field, where the winners again took possession. They kicked over to Sneath, who was compelled to touch. A minute later Petrolea kicked behind London's line, and Hurley in returning it struck a spectator. Referee Livingstone allowed one point.

Petrolea Secured Try. The teams scrimmage at midfield, and as the whistle blew, Dawson started off for end run, after London had stopped play. The distance was followed by the local players, while Petrolea backed over for a try, which Dawson failed to convert.

There was but three-quarters of a minute left to play, but London went onto the field again, and with a few yards of the winners' goal at the final whistle. Score 7 to 0.

FINAL SCORE WAS 14 TO 4

Fast Game at Toronto Saturday Witnessed by Over Thirty-five Hundred People.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—Although the Argos failed to defeat the Hamilton Tigers at Rosedale field Saturday, they gave a victory a stiff battle, as expected, with a final score of 14 to 4.

At half-time the mountaineers led by only 6 to 4, while at the start of the last period the score 11 to 4, the visitors had the wind behind them, and had apparently a good chance to win out, but Tigers showed their ability as finishing by keeping the play in Argos' territory, nearly all the time in the final quarter. The game was witnessed by about 3,500 spectators.

Three policemen on duty were unable to cope with the beachers, who swarmed into the grand stand at half-time and invaded the field in the last quarter.

Not a Try Scored. Not a try was scored, all the points being rolled up by dead line kicks, rouges, and M. Kent's dropped goal, which gave Argos three of their four points.

For Argos the back division played a remarkably steady game, but lack of good running halves was again demonstrated. Their wings were quite good, if not better than the Tigers, with Norcross doing some good tackling. Capt. Correll also shone in this respect. The Tiger halves were unable until towards the end to get away for their usual brilliant runs, but Tope and Simpson did some effective sprinting. A strong northeast wind was a big factor of the game, and the weather was raw and disagreeable. The game was clean, only one penalty being inflicted.
