CHINA'S NAVAL TALK A BLUFF

Oriental, Before Buying Warships, Must Reform Their Financial System.

Peking, May 18.—To make an effective show of naval developments, the advisers of the prince regent have fixed on Nimrod Sound in Chekiang as the principal naval port of China. It offers a fine harbor of refuge, and runs for 50 miles southward of Hangchow. But there is no need to picture it full of oriental men-of-war yet awhile.

Like many other things in the Flowery Land, the naval talk is a bluff. The power of the purse is lacking, to put reality into the recommendations of the Chinese naval commissioners, who recently toured Europe. Till China starts reforming her financial system—and there is no sign of that—nothing more will come out of that expensive commission than a few river gunboats and small coast vessels. Popular imagination figures out a long array of warships barking defiance at the eastern intruders, but in Peking it is well understood such things are chimerical as yet.

There has been talk of three cruisers, one gunboat, two destroyers and two training ships, and the establishment of two naval stations and naval schools. Even that modest programme was appalled the board of revenue. Among the ideas is that a national navy fund should be voluntarily subscribed to raise the \$7,800,000 wanted for a start.

Prince Regent Ching has had a fine chance to get busy with strong men real reforms. Instead, he consorts with reactionary parasites and boodlers. The result is chaos. China's main hope lies in the appearance of some outstanding strong man.

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CLAIMS ONE-THIRD OF BALDWIN GOLD

The Daughter of Lillian Ashley, Whose Sister Shot at the Horseman, Is Claimant.

Boston, May 17.—The story of Mrs. Lillian A. Turnbull, better known to Californians by the name of Lillian Ashley, and her suit to secure her 17-year-old daughter Beatrice a third of the millions left by the late "Lucky" Baldwin, was told by the claimant's attorney, Walter O. Grant.

Everybody in San Francisco remembers the sensational suit brought by Lillian Ashley against Baldwin for betrayal. The case was tried in 1897, and a sensational incident was furnished by the plaintiff's sister, who took a shot at Baldwin in open court. The woman lost her case and afterward disappeared. Now she comes to London, claiming that she was deceived again as Mrs. Turnbull, of Brookline, Mass., and this time with a story of common-law marriage and a daughter she declares to be the offspring of the union.

Mrs. Turnbull's claim is that in March, 1893, Baldwin entered into an agreement of marriage with her in San Francisco by which she became his common law wife. As evidence that Miss Beatrice Turnbull, who is now at a finishing school near New York City, was the offspring of this union, she offers the following certificate of birth, which she says is on record at the city hall in Los Angeles.

"Born at 129 South Olive street, Los Angeles, Dec. 7, 1893, a girl. Mother's maiden name Lillian A. Ashley. Father's name E. J. Baldwin. Dr. J. W. Trueworthy, attending physician."

"Either on March 2 or 3, in 1893, at the Baldwin Hotel in San Francisco, Miss Ashley and Mr. Baldwin entered into a common law marriage," said the lawyer.

"On the evening of this marriage Mr. Baldwin told Miss Ashley he was a divorced man, that he loved her very much and wanted her to become his wife."

"Miss Ashley learned that Baldwin had deceived her, and that there was a living Mrs. Baldwin."

"Of course, Miss Ashley immediately left Mr. Baldwin, but asked him to provide for her. She refused to do more than she would come back and live with him."

"Miss Ashley then went to New York City, where she supported herself and baby by opening a school."

WHISKEY FROM STAVES

Government to Collect \$250,000 a Year From Liquor So Recovered.

Washington, May 18.—Steps will soon be taken by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue Cabell to bring into government coffers some \$250,000 a year, which doesn't go there now, but which he believes rightfully belongs there. The \$250,000 is to come from whiskey people who make a practice of "recovering" whiskey from staves of old whiskey barrels. There are more than 30 concerns in the country which recover spirits from whiskey barrel staves. Cabell estimates that more than 500,000 gallons is recovered every year.

Under the internal revenue regulations, a distillery pays no tax for whiskey which may soak into the barrel. In fact the Government makes an allowance for such soakage. A rectifier, on the other hand, pays for all the whiskey that went into the barrel. Part of the 500,000 gallons that are recovered each year, therefore, has never paid any tax since it has been recovered from barrels on which allowance for soakage has been made, and on which the distiller paid no tax. Just what proportion of the total amount recovered has not paid tax, and what amount has, is hard to determine, but Mr. Cabell figures it is about \$250,000.
