ACQUIRE NEW SCHOOL LANDS

Chairman Weekes Is Opposed to System of Piling Up Large Central Buildings.

COLLEGIATE TOO SMALL

More and Better Accommodation Is Needed There—A Start in Technical Education.

At the inaugural meeting of the board of education held yesterday afternoon, George N. Weekes was chosen as chairman for the coming year. His was the only name suggested, and the selection was unanimous. He was proposed by Dr. Balfour, and the nomination was seconded by Mr. J. L. A. Hunt. He was escorted to the chair by his nominators. In his inaugural address, he thanked the board for the kindness in electing him to so honorable a position. He made several suggestions to the board. The address was as follows:

Chairman's Remarks.

"Gentlemen, I thank you for electing me to this position. It is an honor to be chairman of school trustees even in a country section with one teacher and twenty scholars, and many a good and useful man has occupied that position; but to preside over a board which controls the preparation of the young people for their life's work is an honor which of necessity can come to very few."

"When I reflect upon the illustrious gentlemen who have preceded me in this office, I have a still deeper sense of its importance and responsibility. Nevertheless, I hope to have here, as I have elsewhere, the same spirit of co-operation and to make my term, like the others of late years, one of efficiency and progress."

"During the five years I have been chairman of the board I have had the pleasure of seeing many of my ideas put into practice, the latest being the provision for medical inspection, as to which I moved a resolution early in 1906. The work was moved since that memorable year."

New Schools.

"I. In 1906, also, I urged that instead of adding to the large public schools and making them very large, new school lands should be acquired further out and new schools there planted. I am still of that opinion, and I trust that the board will continue to send their children to the large schools is not a sufficient reason for adding room to room. I trust that in providing any further accommodation which may be required this year, the question I have mentioned may be seriously reconsidered."

"2. Something has been done towards shortening the hours of labor and confinement of the younger children, and still more may perhaps be done."

"3. The value of domestic science classes has now been so well proven in our colleges that I have in my opinion the time has come for extending its benefits to the public schools by establishing one or more centres where it may be taught."

"4. Meanwhile we should extend the plan of feminine manual training now in operation in Victoria school. This will give to the girls the same respo-

from abstract study and the same chance to combine the labor of hand and brain, which manual training affords to the boys."

"5. The more regular practice of physical drill, including marching and simple evolutions as provided for by a resolution of a year ago, should be begun as soon as weather permits. Moreover, the experience of a year or two in a small way would teach us how to use the larger tool of a well-equipped institution."

Technical Training.

"6. The suggestion of Mr. Gammage, last year's chairman, that a start should be made by way of experiment in technical training, appears to me an excellent one, and the very best way to continue the Provincial and Dominion Government that technical schools should be established and that London is the live place in which to begin."

"7. The suggestion that night schools should be established, where many things might be learned for which our young people now send their money abroad to correspondence schools, is a good one, and should be taken up by this board at a very early date."

"8. I suggest also that arrangements be made, as I am sure they may be, for regular visits by our older classes, or boys in public and high schools, to some of our great industrial establishments."

"9. Also for the establishment of classes, which combine training in those establishments with part time work in the schools."

More Accommodation.

"10. More and better accommodation is required for our Collegiate Institute, and the whole large subject should be early considered."

"11. The suggestion of a year ago that all members of the board should be notified of every meeting of the two committees, Nos. 1 and 2, has not been carried out. This should be adopted as a fixed rule. It would enable every member of the board who desired to do so to keep himself fully in touch with the work of the board. Also for the very busy men who compose our board, it will probably be better than combining the committees and necessarily enlarging the quorum."

"In conclusion, gentlemen, I thank you again for the honorable position to which you have elected me, and I assure you that I shall try to do my duty to the best of my ability as God has given me."

The Committee.

Dr. Teasdale, Dr. J. D. Balfour and J. L. A. Hunt formed the striking committee, and the committees for the year were struck as follows:

SENATOR ELKINS STARVED TO DEATH

Poison in the Blood Prevented the Assimilation of Food.

Washington, Jan. 5.—A slow, lingering death, the result of starvation, was the fate of Senator Stephen B. Elkins, who is mourned today by official Washington.

For months the Senator from West Virginia had been fighting in vain against starvation in the midst of plenty. Nothing that his immense wealth could provide could nourish the massive frame that gradually, under the ravages of his ailment, fell away almost to a shadow. An odd sort of nourishment brought from near and far in an attempt to overcome the ailment turned practically to poison in the stomach of the statesman.

Senator Elkins first experience with the fatal sickness followed his arduous work on the railroad. In the Senate last winter he was stricken in New York, and was hurried to his magnificent home at Elkins, West Virginia, where family and surgeons exhausted every resource of wealth and medicine in vain attempts to check the ravages of the illness. The Senator's strong constitution, which had withstood many a severe trial during the summer, but last night he became worse, and passed away at midnight.

The Senator's daughter, Katharine Elkins, was at one time reported to be engaged to the Duke of Abruzzi, and reports persist that the two will yet be married. The Duke has attracted the world's attention. At one time the duke, who is close to the throne of Italy, went to the Himalayas to cool his ardor, and royal influence had blocked his desires.

REDMOND SAYS ULSTER VOTED FOR HOME RULE

Declares That Protestants Will Have Equal Rights With Catholics.

London, Jan. 6.—John E. Redmond, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party, devotes a long article in the London papers to an endeavor to remove the Unionist objections to home rule, based on the fear that the Ulster Protestants will be unfairly treated. He assembles a great array of statistics and figures of the recent elections, showing that five of the "Tontin", nine counties are overwhelmingly Catholic, while, excluding Belfast, the whole of Ulster actually voted for home rule by a majority of 1288.

Mr. Redmond argues that in face of the fact that the whole of Ulster includes 44 per cent. Catholics, Ulster cannot be claimed as a Protestant province. Further, he quotes historical records, and the testimony of Protestant historians, like Taylor and Lecky, to show that a spirit of toleration has always been exercised by Irish Catholics, and to prove that Ireland's national movement for generations have been conducted by Protestants.

He declares that Ulster has nothing to fear, and that if home rule is granted the Protestant majority will have equal rights and liberties with the Catholics.

MARQUETTE FERRY IS FAST IN THE ICE

With Broken Propeller, Crippled Steamer Is Hemmed in Near Marine City.

Marine City, Mich., Jan. 5.—For 36 hours the Ann Arbor ferry, No. 35, the largest car ferry on the Great Lakes, battled with the gigantic ice pack that has formed in the River St. Clair at this time, and the crippled steamer lies helpless, surrounded by ice floes that are piling higher and higher. The vessel is sheathed in ice on board the ferry, which is upward bound to Frankfort, was a large number of officials of the company. This afternoon, after the propeller broke off, the officials clambered over the side of the ship and walked ashore, making their way to this city. They left later for Detroit and will go on to Toledo.

Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock the Ann Arbor was in sight of this port. The ice was piling up dangerously at that time, but the ice crusher at the bow of the boat had made it possible for the ferry to defy it.

The sudden rise in temperature packs along the shore and directly in the path of the steamer. The progress of the boat became very slow, and when it had proceeded to about a mile distant from Marine City, it lost headway, the crusher being unable to break the ice.

The churning of the big propeller in the ship's effort to shake off the ice drew away from the vessel. It became apparent that the boat could not proceed, and so a crew came ashore. This afternoon the official forecast was that the ice was fast sealing in the ferry, and it may be days, unless a sudden drop in temperature comes, before the ship is able to make headway.

MANIC STEALS HOUSE

Hamstead, N. Y., Jan. 5.—George Pusbury, an escaped maniac, is back in the asylum at Central Islip, L. I., today, after a week's vacation spent in the country home of David Campbell, of New York, at Holbrook, L. I. Pusbury appropriated the house to his own uses and successfully defied all attempts to remove him for four days. Campbell went out to the house last Sunday and was greeted by the maniac.

"This is my house," declared the man in possession. "Get out," Campbell got.

He informed the local authorities and an attack was begun. That was on Sunday, and Pusbury repulsed every assault, using Campbell's dishes and furniture for ammunition. Wednesday, when the house was carried by a rush of officers and volunteers and its valiant defender removed, bound hand and foot.
